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

# ¡Qué felicidad! ¡Sí que hay justicia!

Fue con alegría y gran satisfacción que leímos sobre la sospechosa contribución de \$200,000 hecha por Brooks Pharmacy al Festival of Trees, la organización no lucrativa favorita de la Alcaldesa de Methuen.

La Ciudad de Methuen, a través del Director de Desarrollo Económico, David Aucoin, llegó a un acuerdo con Brooks Pharmacy de pagar \$650,000 por el "derecho" a construir una tienda. El Concilio lo sabía y no dijo ni una palabra cuando el cheque llegó con \$200,000 de menos. Ahora están pretendiendo que no sabían nada o que no lo notaron.

Por los últimos tres o cuatro años, Ellen Bahan ha estado escribiendo sobre el dudoso propósito de esta organización no lucrativa administrada por la Alcaldesa Sharon Pollard. Durante ese tiempo, tuvimos que soportar insultos y acusaciones llamando a la Sra. Bahan y a todos nosotros envueltos en Rumbo toda clase de vejaciones cuando lo único que hicimos fue publicar la verdad.

Ellen sabía que el Festival of Trees era una organización engañosa y cuestionaba su contabilidad y a dónde realmente iba el dinero recaudado durante este evento anual. La única razón por la que nos enteramos de este caso es porque es un año de elecciones y alguien le va a sacar provecho al escándalo; de lo contrario, lo hubiesen seguido tapando. Una auditoría nos pudiera mostrar con qué frecuencia estos tratos con la Alcaldesa Pollard han tenido lugar.

## Rejoice, there's justice!

**I**t was with glee and a great deal of satisfaction that I read about the questionable contribution of \$200,000 made by Brooks Pharmacy to the Festival of Trees, Methuen Mayor's favorite charity.

The Town of Methuen, through the Economic Development Director, David Aucoin, had made an agreement with Brooks Pharmacy to pay the city \$650,000 for the "right" to build a store. The City Council was aware of that deal and did not say a word when the check came in \$200,000 short. Now they are pretending they didn't know or it went unnoticed.

For the past three or four years Ellen Bahan has been writing about the dubious purpose of this non-profit organization headed by Mayor Sharon Pollard. During that time, we all had to endure insults and accusations calling Ms. Bahan and all of us involved in Rumbo all kinds of derogatory names when all we did was publish the truth.

Ellen knew how deceiving the Festival of Trees is as an organization and she questioned the record keeping and where the money raised in that annual event was really going. The only reason we heard about this case is because this is an election year and somebody is going to reap some benefit from the scandal; if it weren't for that, they would have continued covering it up. An audit might show how prevalent these deals have been with Mayor Pollard.

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# Sullivan a reelegirse basado en su récord

Este es un año de elecciones en Lawrence pero tal parece como si el Alcalde Michael J. Sullivan no intenta postularse para la re-elección. El está muy callado como si fuera suficiente ser re-elegido basado en su récord de construcción.

Las pocas veces que el Alcalde Sullivan ha hablado públicamente, ha sido para alardear sobre la nueva escuela secundaria, el centro de transportación, el acueducto, tantas nuevas casas que han sido construidas, etc. Mientras que es cierto que hay muchas personas (latinos y anglos) que saben desde hace años a quién quieren ver en el poder y no quieren que los convenganz razonando con lógica, el récord de construcción no es lo suficiente para lograr que elijan a nadie.

El Alcalde Sullivan ha mostrado un récord pésimo lidiando con muchas áreas de interés de los residentes tales como no tomar medidas para corregir la situación en la Oficina de Planeamiento y Desarrollo hasta que fue demasiado tarde y el Departamento de Vivienda y Desarrollo Urbano tuvo que intervenir.

Por dos años y medio, a Rumbo le ha sido prohibido entrar en las escuelas o en las oficinas del departamento escolar y la reacción del alcalde ha sido que no quiere intervenir en las decisiones del superintendente escolar, permitiéndole así violar nuestro derecho constitucional de libertad de prensa y expresión.

Su debilidad tratando con el Comité Escolar es notoria. Como Chairman, el debió demandar que Carlos Ramos aclarara si vive o no en el distrito que representa en lugar de adoptar la altanera actitud de "El lugar donde yo vivo no es asunto de nadie." Laura Vanderveer piensa que el Comité Escolar es un club privado en el cual ella puede entrar y salir a su antojo, manteniendo un récord de asistencia pésimo.

No debemos olvidarnos que el Comité Escolar estuvo sin vicepresidente por muchos meses y el alcalde no pudo hallar un consenso entre sus miembros para seleccionar un reemplazo cuando Michael Sweeney se fue. Requirió que el alcalde estuviera fuera de la ciudad y que el Presidente del Concilio Patrick Blanchette se hiciera cargo de la reunión para lograr que acordaran en uno.

El alcalde tampoco tomó acción con el desastre que es el Departamento de Obras Públicas lo cual se ha estado documentando en Rumbo por años. Las condiciones tan deplorables en que trabajan los obreros del City Yard con el techo cayéndose y mojándose cuando llueve. Los obreros están obligados a respirar los desperdicios peligrosos que acumulan allí por meses y en el invierno tienen que trabajar turnos de 24 horas durante las tormentas de nieve en camiones sin calefacción. El salario de Andrea Traficanti pudiera ser mejor empleado en comprar un camión cada año y nadie la echaría de menos.

Su forma de obrar con el contrato de la televisión por cable y la estación de televisión de acceso público fue una señal clara de que el Alcalde Sullivan evade las controversias y hacer las cosas correctas.

Por más de dos años, muchas personas lo han estado asesorando sobre el futuro del Canal 8, el Canal de Acceso Público. No ha habido escasez de información y conocimientos provistos al alcalde para poder continuar trayendo educación y entretenimiento a nuestros residentes pero el alcalde prefirió ignorarlos. El pasado noviembre, la Comisión Asesora del Cable puso en su agenda discutir el contrato del cable cuando se enteró que el alcalde lo había firmado la semana anterior. Esta es

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otra junta directiva insignificante ya que al Alcalde Sullivan le importaba poco su opinión o sugerencias. Inclusive desdeñó las recomendaciones del Abogado de la Ciudad Charles Boddy con respecto al contrato y el alquiler de espacio para construir el estudio de televisión. Consejos recibió y muchos; él prefirió escuchar a la gente errónea.

Todo llegó a su fin el 28 de febrero cuando Comcast por fin nos cerró las puertas del estudio en Glenn St. Dos meses han pasado; no hay estudio ni planes para encontrar el espacio adecuado para construirlo.

El Alcalde Sullivan pudiera fácilmente culpar a la junta directiva al estilo de Mickey Mouse que él formó para una organización no-lucrativa en octubre - Lawrence Cable Access Televisión (LCAT) - que se hará cargo de los canales 8 y 22. No es mi intención faltarle el respeto a Mickey Mouse pero este grupo fue organizado tomando simplemente gente que tenía a su alrededor sin prestar mucha atención a si tenían un verdadero interés en ver que las estaciones tuvieran éxito. Con la excepción de Mike Garrihy, un voluntario en la Iglesia de San Patricio que hace los videos de los servicios religiosos y programas de entrevistas para pasarlos por el Canal 8, a ninguno de ellos les importa.

Jorge De Jesús, el asistente del alcalde, se pone nervioso cuando le preguntó si hay algo nuevo con la estación y se quiere lavar las manos en seguida. Eli Bernabé, asistente de recursos humanos en el ayuntamiento tampoco pudo contestar mis preguntas. "A mí me reclutaron para esa junta directiva y no soy responsable de las decisiones que se hagan," me respondió por teléfono. Tengo una advertencia para ella: Siendo miembro de esa junta directiva, ella es responsable de las decisiones que se tomen - aún cuando ella no haya sido consultada. De ella depende reclamar por qué han tomado decisiones sin tan siquiera haberse reunido.

Víctor Abramson me dijo que él está a punto de renunciar porque no quiere ser utilizado poniendo su nombre en esa lista.

Pero es un año de elecciones. El Canal 8 pudiera estar usando para educar e informar al público sobre los candidatos y los temas de importancia. No teniendo un estudio dificulta la producción de programas de esa clase para los voluntarios con mínima experiencia en la producción de televisión o práctica técnica.

¿Se dan cuenta? Es muy conveniente mantener el Canal 8 bajo el control de un régimen totalitario como el del departamento escolar. Esto fue precisamente lo que mis artículos anteriores trataron de prevenir. El Alcalde Sullivan puede ahora decir que LCAT está al cargo sin necesariamente echarle la culpa al departamento escolar. Su inacción fue realmente una movida bien calculada.

Joseph F. Sweeney nació el 4 de marzo de 1930. Sus setenta y cinco años los ha vivido en Lawrence. Es graduado del Lawrence High School, clase de 1947. Es Veterano del US Army 1951-1953 y Administrador de Relaciones Públicas Retirado de AT&T.

Joe es Presidente Retirado del Programa de Voluntarios (R.S.V.P.) donde sirvió por 32 años. Miembro de la Junta de Gobierno de la Biblioteca Pública de Lawrence por 13 años. Presidente del Lawrence Council on Aging por 4 años. Antiguo miembro del Greater Lawrence Vocational Technical High School por 22 años. Antiguo Presidente del Capítulo de la Cruz Roja del Merrimack Valley y antiguo Comisionado de la Lawrence Youth Commission.

Joe Sweeney ha sido un dedicado defensor de los programas y servicios dedicados a mejorar la calidad de vida de los ancianos. Joseph P. Sweeney fue Presidente del Lawrence Council on Aging

(LCOA) desde 1996 al 2000. En esa capacidad él fue el líder dedicado a proveer servicios a los ancianos de la Ciudad de Lawrence. Él trabajó para identificar las necesidades de la población anciana de Lawrence y los recursos disponibles para cubrir tales necesidades.

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## Devers responde ataque de Sullivan

"Los desesperados ataques bajos del alcalde contra Devers son un perjuicio para la ciudad"

El pasado viernes 22 de abril del 2005, el Alcalde de Lawrence, Michael Sullivan emitió un comunicado de prensa titulado: "Un historial del cual sentirse orgulloso", en el cual me acusa de estar políticamente motivado junto a otros en mis intentos para asistir a un grupo de comerciantes de Lawrence quienes están en medio de una disputa con la Administración de Sullivan sobre el cumplimiento con los códigos de la ciudad.

La nota de prensa del alcalde es otro ejemplo de que el ejecutivo no sabe de lo que está hablando. En su empeño por destacar que está orgulloso de su historial sobre derechos humanos en nuestra ciudad, se confunde al no poder presentar algún logro tangible que lo avale.

Primero: él demuestra una carencia absoluta de entender cuál es el trabajo de un funcionario público. Como concejal que he sido en los últimos seis años en toda la ciudad de Lawrence, represento a todos y cada uno de sus habitantes. Yo he pasado ese período construyendo puentes de entendimiento entre todos los grupos de esta ciudad- latinos y no latinos, con la única meta de lograr una unidad fuerte y decidida para beneficio de todos los lawrencianos. Durante la controversia con los comerciantes me he esforzado en todo momento en conocer la realidad de los hechos y en ningún momento me he desviado de la línea recta de la verdad para antojadizamente imputarle a alguien la culpa.

Como parte de mi trabajo, frecuentemente recibo llamadas telefónicas de personas quejándose o cuestionando sobre algo que está pasando en esta ciudad. También asisto a ciento de reuniones cada año organizadas por nuestras juntas de vecinos y por varios grupos de residentes que ayudan a mejorar nuestra ciudad. Muchas veces estas reuniones son aprovechadas para resolver problemas que se han generado entre nuestros residentes y el gobierno municipal al cual ellos le pagan impuestos para financiar el presupuesto del gobierno. En cada instancia, yo escucho con mucha atención lo que la gente tiene que decir y analizo si existe algún asunto legítimo que merezca ser atendido. Algunas veces ha habido falta de comunicación de esta administración municipal con la ciudadanía, dejando a los residentes confundidos por los malos entendidos.

Como miembro del Consejo de esta ciudad, la función más importante que yo

tengo es comunicarme con mis representados, que son todos, y averiguar cómo puedo atender sus necesidades. Después de todo, ellos son quienes pagan las facturas. Es desafortunado que el Alcalde piense que hablar con los mantenedores de la ciudad para determinar los hechos sea "motivado políticamente", en vez de verlo como es- una buena y debida diligencia.

Segundo: la acción más reciente del Alcalde, abandonar la reunión con los comerciantes la semana pasada sin decir una palabra para atender a sus reclamos, muestra una carencia absoluta de respeto y cortesía para esos comerciantes. Uno de mis deberes como concejal es escuchar a la gente y dialogar con ellos. A veces yo puedo estar de acuerdo o en desacuerdo con ellos, pero respeto su opinión y más importante aún, su derecho a expresar esa opinión. El Alcalde tiene una concepción sobre lo que es el servicio público a todas luces equivocadas.

Y tercero: con sus acciones el Alcalde demuestra su incompetencia para seguir dirigiendo los destinos de esta ciudad. Tal y como he dicho antes, el Alcalde debió tener el deseo y el valor para escuchar las quejas, anunciar medidas correctivas para

resolver la controversia y si era inminente el tener que ausentarse, haber dejado sus planteamientos con algún funcionario de su administración para que en su ausencia los expusiera a la sala. Un Alcalde competente buscaría cotejar los servicios de sus encargados de departamentos con las preguntas que tienen los ciudadanos respecto a lo que el gobierno municipal está haciendo.

Si el alcalde quiere llevar adelante una política de "no ver ni escuchar el mal" esa es su prerrogativa. Para mí esa es una política incorrecta que en nada favorece a la comunidad.

En cuanto a su proclamado "Un historial del cual sentirse orgulloso", sus políticas solo han conseguido exacerbar una situación delicada como secuela de la falta de respeto y consideración a la ciudadanía con su actitud frente a los comerciantes. Ha demostrado, el Alcalde su falta de entendimiento acerca de nuestra tarea como funcionarios electos, y sobre todo su incompetencia para seguir dirigiendo a esta ciudad.

Yo me propongo crear Una Ciudad con Una Visión, y la Administración Sullivan no es un ejemplo para emular.

*"En realidad, yo soy Halle Berry enmascarada," Nilka Alvarez-Rodríguez.*

Con ese comentario y con su habitual sentido de humor, Nilka Alvarez-Rodríguez abrió la charla a la cual había sido invitada en celebración del Décimo Aniversario del Programa de Estudios de las Féminas en Merrimack Collage, donde ella es profesora. (adjunct)

Su tema fue "Las dificultades que las mujeres confrontan en la política local; el mito de la belleza perfecta; La mujer y la vejez; y Organizando a la mujer latina."

La trayectoria de Nilka desde la pobreza de su infancia en New York y el suicidio de su padre a la edad de nueve años, hasta el Community Caucus on the Status of Women, el Congreso Nacional de Mujeres del Vecindario y su trabajo más tarde con las Naciones Unidas sobre asuntos de mujeres la capacitó para ser la oradora invitada.

Su trabajo con el National Congress of Neighborhood Women hizo posible que algunos miembros fueran a la Conferencia Mundial de Mujeres en Beijing, China. "Yo no asistí a la conferencia porque yo sabía que estas mujeres le iban a sacar más provecho que yo," explicó a la audiencia con orgullo.

En el 1998 Nilka se mudó para

Lawrence con su esposo Richard Rodríguez y dos hijos ya adolescentes y en el 1999 fue elegida al Concilio de Lawrence.

"Mientras que mi oponente se la pasaba quejándose de la basura, la suciedad y las condiciones tan deplorables de la ciudad, yo les hablaba de esperanza y cómo arreglar los problemas", dijo Nilka. "Por lo regular, la gente quiere que los inspiren."

Lo primero que ella hizo fue crear un Concilio Juvenil de Gobierno formado por estudiantes de las 4 escuelas secundarias sirviendo a Lawrence. También estableció una coalición de líderes comunitarios que no hablaban unos con otros. De ahí, escribió la carta con la designación que fue enviada a Washington, D. C., lo que más tarde se convirtió en el Programa de Weed and Seed,


lo cual ella considera el logro de su visión.

Desde su posición en el Concilio, la Concejal Alvarez-Rodríguez ha podido trabajar con la Oficina de Planeamiento y Desarrollo en cuando a viviendas, lotes vacíos, etc., pero ella sabía que el tema principal tenía que ser relacionado a las drogas y su trabajo con el Greater Lawrence Family Health Center tomó un aspecto más complejo.

La audiencia pudo hacerle preguntas con respecto a las barreras culturales con que las latinas se encuentran y Nilka hizo referencia a una historia que utiliza en su salón de clases sobre unas gallinas que criaron a un águila. Cuando ya el águila creció y le dijeron que no era gallina, no supo qué hacer o cómo comportarse y tuvo que aprender todo eso. Entonces le pide a sus estudiantes que escriban su interpretación de la historia y sorprendentemente, muchos lo comparan con sus propias vidas; hasta ven a sus padres representados en el granjero.

"Pero la comunidad de habla española se está alejando de elegir a latinas," explicó. "Estamos buscando a mujeres de calidad que nos representen. Se sorprenderán al ver lo que pueden lograr cuando no miramos la apariencia ni el color de la piel y trabajamos unidos con otras personas. Ahora le ha llegado a la gente joven de motivar esta acción", pidió a los estudiantes que estaban entre la audiencia.

Por los últimos siete años, la Concejal Nilka Alvarez-Rodríguez ha organizado el Simposio de Mujeres trayendo a mujeres de todas nacionalidades y nivel educacional a discutir temas de actualidad, proveyendo educación y de nuevo, esperanza.

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## La forma más efectiva de inspeccionar una casa

La inspección de la propiedad es el procedimiento que podría salvar al comprador de una inversión desastrosa y proporcionarle la seguridad de que está haciendo un negocio lucrativo, sin embargo, muchos compradores no le dan la importancia correspondiente al proceso de inspección y en algunos casos no leen el reporte que le suple el inspector.

Cuando se hace la oferta para comprar una propiedad de bienes raíces es imprescindible incluir una cláusula especificando que si los resultados de la inspección no son satisfactorios la oferta será retirada sin ningún tipo de penalidad.

El comprador debe empezar el proceso de inspección en el momento que visita la propiedad por primera vez. Tan pronto el futuro dueño arriba al lugar debe hacer una observación crítica de los alrededores. En muchas ocasiones los problemas no están en la propiedad, sino en el vecindario. El reporte del inspector solo incluirá lo concerniente a la propiedad. El comprador debe decidir cuáles son los detalles que se convertirán en inconvenientes cuando sea el propietario.

Por favor, no se apresure en entrar en la propiedad. Deténgase, no se acerque todavía. Observe el techo, las ventanas, las puertas, el nivel o desnivel del terreno, el tendido eléctrico y todos los cables y tuberías que entran a la propiedad. Haga preguntas y tome notas.

El techo evita que penetre humedad a la casa, pero también funciona como protector de las paredes exteriores y su apariencia le da una mejor vista a la propiedad. No es recomendable que se suba al techo en la primera visita. El estado general del techo se puede observar desde afuera. Los daños más

comunes ocurren en las líneas terminales y en los ángulos creados por cambio de estructuras, especialmente, donde se han instalado antenas o donde empieza la chimenea.

Observe si existe algún tipo de desnivel en la estructura. Esto podría ser señal de problemas serios. Ahora concentre su atención en las paredes y sus revestimientos. Las paredes exteriores, generalmente, son de madera, ladrillo o metal y en la mayoría de los casos tiene algún tipo de revestimiento. No es necesario ser un experto para notar una gran cantidad de los problemas.

Observe la casa gradualmente, mantenga una actitud completamente objetiva, sin dejarse influenciar por la nitidez o la desorganización de los residentes de la propiedad. Es necesario establecer la diferencia entre las propiedades personales de los residentes y la propiedad que usted está comprando.

La paciencia es un factor importante en este proceso. Deténgase un minuto más y piense en los diferentes tipos de insectos, especialmente en las termitas.

Estos destructores hacen su entrada triunfal a través de madera en la estructura exterior de la casa que está directamente en contacto con la tierra, luego usan la madera del interior de la casa como residencia y comida. La termita es considerada como la plaga de madera más destructiva que existe.

Por favor, no entre a la casa todavía, manténgase en el frente hasta el próximo artículo, en el cual hablaré del proceso de inspección del interior.

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
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## ¿Qué hacemos con los suspensos?

Cuando un chico acude a casa con varios Insuficientes o suspensos en el boletín de notas, el padre suele reaccionar enfadándose y echando una regañina al hijo. Quizás tome la decisión de aplicar algún castigo y buscar un profesor particular.

Sin embargo, antes de tomar decisiones y actuar, lo prudente es buscar toda la información posible sobre las causas de esa situación. Y para averiguar las causas, puede concertar una entrevista con el tutor del colegio o con algún profesor específico directamente relacionado con los suspensos. La otra fuente de información es el propio chico que en una conversación distendida puede aportar luz sobre las causas del fracaso escolar.

Los malos resultados pueden obedecer a diversas causas. En algunas ocasiones puede deberse a falta de esfuerzo del chico para llevar al día los trabajos y estudiar lo suficiente. Puede dedicar menos tiempo del necesario o no aprovechar debidamente ese tiempo al hacer un estudio con poca intensidad, es decir, con poca concentración, bajo nivel de comprensión y falta de memorización de lo estudiado.

En otras ocasiones el alumno se esfuerza y dedica bastante tiempo al estudio, pero no consigue resultados satisfactorios. Puede deberse a una falta de capacidad intelectual general o para alguna asignatura concreta. Otra causa, bastante frecuente en la actualidad, es el bajo nivel de lectura comprensiva, asociada a una falta de vocabulario y a la falta de hábitos de lectura. Puede deberse también a una falta de base de conocimientos que son imprescindibles para adquirir conocimientos superiores. Y en último lugar, hay que considerar unas técnicas de estudio deficientes, cuando el alumno no ha adquirido los hábitos de hacer subrayados, esquemas y cuadros sinópticos y capacidad de repasar y memorizar las ideas principales del tema.

Una vez conocidas las causas de los suspensos es el momento de tomar decisiones para subsanar las deficiencias o falta de hábitos. Quizás sea suficiente con dedicar más tiempo al estudio, pero en otras ocasiones hará falta una ayuda especial por parte del tutor o de algún profesor del colegio o algún compañero de estudio. Con todos los datos se puede hacer un plan de recuperación especial, pero nunca reprender por malas notas sin antes conocer las causas que los provocan.

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## Lantigua busca fondos para organizaciones locales, centro de tecnología y seguridad pública

El Representante Estatal William Lantigua (D-Lawrence) ha presentado 12 enmiendas al presupuesto estatal para el año fiscal del 2006. Si es adoptado, la mayoría de estas enmiendas beneficiarán a organizaciones sin fines lucrativos del área.

"Yo sigo luchando fuerte por Lawrence," dijo Lantigua. "Aunque como cuerpo legislativo abogamos por asuntos que afectan al estado completo como el cuidado de la salud, educación o ancianos, las agencias no lucrativas son las que dan vida a cada comunidad. Ellas son muy importantes para mí."

Nueve de las 12 enmiendas piden fondos para organizaciones de servicio comunitario basadas en Lawrence: Arlington Neighborhood Association,

\$145,000; Casa Dominicana, \$125,000; Dominican American Voting Council, \$45,000; Family Services of Lawrence, \$135,000; Food for the World Pantry, \$53,000; Lawrence Learning Center and Community Development, \$105,000; Neighbors in Need, \$125,000; New England Puerto Rican Association, \$125,000; y Our House Family Learning Center, \$1 millón. Lantigua también presentó una propuesta para lograr \$7.5 millones para la expansión del Centro Tecnológico de Northern Essex Community Collage.

Lantigua también busca la forma de aumentar la seguridad pública pidiendo \$200,000 para el Departamento de Bomberos y en una enmienda auspiciada

con el Representante David Torrisi de North Andover y el Representante Barry Finegold de Andover, una dádiva de \$100,000 para la policía comunitaria.

Una vez que la Cámara de Representantes decida cuáles enmiendas aprobar, su propuestas serán enviadas al Senado para más debate. Las enmiendas endosadas por el Senado son entonces enviadas a un comité especial.

Lantigua dice que tiene la esperanza que todas sus enmiendas sean aprobadas pero reconoce que él y sus colegas confrontan decisiones muy difíciles en las semanas que siguen. "Todos queremos que nuestras comunidades se beneficien, pero el dinero es limitado," nos dijo.

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

# Disuelva la grasa sin liposucción

¿Qué es la Mesoterapia? ¿Cómo funciona? "Meso" en griego significa medio y mesoterapia es la estimulación de los tejidos medios de la piel. Esta es la más moderna técnica para luchar contra la grasa. Mesoterapia es un tratamiento prácticamente sin dolor que emplea múltiples microinyecciones superficiales usando pequeñas dosis de una combinación de drogas farmacéuticas aprobadas por la FDA y compuestos homeopáticos conteniendo plantas naturales, extractos, antioxidantes, vitaminas y aminoácidos en la capa mesodérmica (la capa media) de la piel.

La Mesoterapia fue desarrollada hace más de 50 años (1952) por un médico francés, el Dr. Michel Pistor. Para el 1961, el Dr. Pistor publicó su primer libro sobre sus investigaciones y los resultados de mesoterapia en el alivio de dolor, remover grasa, tratamiento de celulitis, pérdida de peso y espasmos musculares. En 1976, el Primer Congreso de Mesoterapia tuvo lugar y en 1987 la Academia Francesa de Medicina lo reconoció como parte de la medicina tradicional.

Mesoterapia estimula la reparación de la mesodermia, incluyendo la piel, tejidos conectivos y tejidos adiposos. Las inyecciones son aplicadas donde se siente dolor, hay enfermedad presente o el área específica que deseas tratar. Es como una "bala medicinal" que lleva la medicina directamente al punto del cuerpo, actuando como un sistema eficiente de entrega. La medicina penetra lentamente en la

estructura celular y puede ser notado semanas después del tratamiento y lo puede ver hasta tres semanas después del tratamiento.

Este método de administración sobrepasa las rutas orales, gastrointestinales y el hígado. Un ejemplo de esto es que si la medicina es para tratar inflamación en un hombro, solamente una pequeña porción de lo que toma oralmente llega realmente a ese lugar que quiere tratar. La mayoría de los medicamentos tomados oralmente terminan siendo distribuidos en una forma diluida por todo el cuerpo.

### Celulitis y reducción de peso

El término médico para la celulitis es dermatomyoliposclerosis. La celulitis afecta a más del 90% de las mujeres americanas. Es una de las condiciones más difíciles de tratar. Con frecuencia les dicen que no hay remedio. La celulitis no discrimina porque afecta a mujeres de todo tipo: delgadas, atléticas y sedentarias. Contrario a la creencia popular la celulitis no es causada por tener sobrepeso. Sin embargo, se conoce como una condición de las féminas porque afecta principalmente a las mujeres.

Hay muchas teorías sobre la causa de celulitis. Los factores que juegan un papel en el desarrollo de celulitis son interesantes. La celulitis es parcialmente genética/étnica/geográfica y encontrada con más frecuencia en las culturas que rodean el Mar Mediterráneo. Factores metabólicos (comidas, estilo de vida, hormonas) también

## Misionarios jóvenes traen buenas noticias y ayuda a la República Dominicana

Lally vive en Good Shepard Parish en la Ciudad de New York, pero si usted quiere encontrarlo durante los meses de febrero o julio, tiene que viajar hacia el sur, a la República Dominicana. Por más de 20 años, Lally ha venido trabajando con jóvenes inmigrantes, primero en Boston y ahora en New York, para atraerlos a formar parte de la comunidad, enseñarlos como alcanzar a otros y formar líderes para el futuro.

Al centro de este ministerio está Misión Joven Dominicana, fundada en 1989 "para proveer a jóvenes hispanos en los Estados Unidos de una nueva ventana en el mensaje del evangelio". El pasado mes de julio, durante su vigésima primera misión, Lally y siete jóvenes volaron desde New York hacia una isla aún devastada por las inundaciones y avalanchas que azotaron a Haití el 24 de Mayo, y virtió refugiados a través de la frontera dentro de República Dominicana.

Los newyorkinos fueron recibidos por 30 jóvenes en la República Dominicana, que han sido entrenados en misiones anteriores los cuales trabajan allí con el Coordinador Tony González.

Después de un retiro de dos días, los misionarios se dirigieron a cuatro pueblos diferentes para construir una capilla, para evangelizar, preparar a las personas para ser bautizadas y consolar a los desesperados refugiados que perdieron hogares y familiares.

Joanny Corsino fué uno de los jóvenes de la misión. "Nuestro principal trabajo era el dejarles saber que nosotros los acompañábamos en su dolor", escribió ella. "Nosotros estábamos allí para elevar sus espíritus". Escuchando sus relatos de sufrimiento y esperanza, Corsino experimentó su propia conversión. "Entre

más hablaba con la comunidad, más yo comprendía de que había algo dentro de mí que necesitaba ser sanado. Yo pedí a Dios por su perdón, (y ahora) las cosas en casa están muy diferentes. Yo fui a elevar los espíritus de la comunidad de Jimaní y al final era yo la que estaba necesitada de elevar mi corazón".

Lally ha visto estas cosas suceder entre los chicos de New York y Boston, cuyas raíces están dentro de la cultura latina pero que han perdido contacto con esas raíces dentro de la sociedad de consumo de Norteamérica. Ellos ven a personas viviendo en piso de tierra y techos de hojas de palma y comienzan a preguntarse "porqué estas personas lucen estar contentas careciendo de todas las cosas que yo creo que yo necesito. Pone las cosas en perspectiva", dice Lally.

Oscar Fernández formó parte del grupo construyendo una pequeña capilla en Boca Cachón, a petición del pastor de allí. Fernández es nativo de la República Dominicana pero nunca había estado en esta parte al suroeste de su lugar de nacimiento en Santiago. "Las personas aquí son bellas", dice, "y fué aún más bello el trabajar juntos por gente que necesita ayuda".

Giovanny Taveras, 21, también nació en República Dominicana y al igual que Fernández nunca había visto esta parte del país. Su primera Misión Joven fué "una de las mejores cosas que nunca me habían sucedido". Taveras estuvo envuelto en evangelización con jóvenes norteamericanos y dominicanos, "haciendo que las personas sigan a Dios", según dice él. "Todos estábamos trabajando con un mismo fin y lo logramos".

Antes que los misionarios regresaran a casa, Lally bautizó a más de 400 individuos en los pueblos y comunidades con los que ellos compartieron las buenas noticias.

# ¿Un nuevo Papa nombrado?

Fue Thomas P. O'Neil, conocido con el apodo de Tip, famoso representante y Vocero de la Cámara de Representantes en Washington, quien dijo que toda política es local. Yo estoy de acuerdo. También creo que toda religión es local. Por favor permítaseme elaborar como de costumbre.

La elección de un nuevo Papa hoy día, ciertamente no así en época de reducidos medios de comunicación en el pasado, es uno de esos eventos universales que combinan dolor y gozo. Primero los creyentes sufren la pena y el vacío de la pérdida de lo familiar e inmediatamente después que se anuncia que un nuevo hombre ha sido nombrado para sustituirlo, ese dolor se reemplaza con la felicidad de saber que después de todo hay un sucesor. Es el viejo refrán "el rey ha muerto, viva el rey."

La ceremonia y sí, la pompa, que rodea los elaborados servicios funerales y el misterio del cónclave donde el Colegio de Cardenales elige a la nueva cabeza de la Iglesia le añade fascinación al evento. Que nos concentremos por horas frente al color del humo anunciador que emana de la sencilla chimenea en la Plaza de San Pedro le suma un aire de secreto, maravilla y entretenimiento a la tradición.

Especulamos sin fin sobre quien va a ser elegido, en realidad no una apuesta muy difícil. Después de todo, el Papa se decide entre un grupo pequeño de Cardenales, que no excede de ciento veinte. Uno de 120 es un buen lote. La selección de los líderes en las sociedades democráticas se lleva a cabo en un medio y ambiente de incertidumbre, los resultados no conocidos hasta que se termina el proceso de acusaciones y empujones, figurativa y literalmente. Estamos seguros de quien va a heredar el trono inglés: se llama linaje. Podemos

especular si el Príncipe Charles o uno de sus hijos van a ascender al trono cuando se vacíe, pero las opciones son muy limitadas. No con el Papa: los candidatos son pocos y menos los escogidos.

He dejado fuera de mi análisis a la multitud de pequeños tiranos en el mundo secular que están o han estado en el poder a través de la historia, porque sabemos que arribaron debido a ciertas condiciones propicias que lo hicieron posible, el caso trágico de Castro en Cuba un ejemplo, y han sido mantenidos por sus artimañas y su astucia y por aquellos que los rodean siguiendo sus propios intereses personalistas. Pero el Papa es o debe ser diferente.

La historia del papado no solo ha sido larga, sino turbulenta. La medida de la barra que alzó el Papa Juan Pablo II ha sido muy elevada. Otros Papas no estaban tan preocupados sobre esa medida, tal vez sus objetivos más mundanos. Solo tenemos que leer la lista de las muchas Cruzadas y la Inquisición patrocinadas por otros papas para darnos cuenta. Muchas de las rebeliones "heréticas" de los primeros años del milenio que acaba de terminar acusaban al Papa de ser el Anticristo y a la jerarquía de la Curia romana sus cómplices. El fuego destruyó a muchas iglesias y basílicas europeas que el populacho creía ser el templo del diablo, no el lugar sagrado de los benditos. Muchas de las escisiones católicas de la edad media que se conocen hoy día con el nombre respetable de "religión" comenzaron con una insurrección contra el Papa de la época o la práctica de la política que representaba.

Estoy continuamente asombrado por esperanzados que discuten seriamente la posible orientación filosófica y teológica de un nuevo Papado. La discusión revuelve sobre el tema del cambio. Creer o aspirar que un nuevo Papa pueda considerar la posibilidad de cambiar las direcciones de teología y dogma que lo llevaron a esa posición en primer lugar y fueron las razones fundamentales por el alejamiento de los creyentes a través de los siglos es insólito. La Iglesia Católica, como toda fe dogmática, es un tren lento que ha viajado

a través de raíles de dos mil años de largo y lo hace ignorando acusaciones o aspiraciones de cambio de aquellos que se hayan en la cuneta y piensan diferente. ¿Por qué va a decidir cambiar hoy día? me pregunto. ¿Por qué alguna vez? Es mejor irse a otra parte con la música de cambiar. Usando un ejemplo secular: republicanos y demócratas que quisieran cambiar la filosofía de sus partidos para que sean más como el opuesto solo tienen que cruzar la cerca.

Anteriormente dije que la religión es local. El número reducido de nuevas vocaciones de ambos géneros en la Iglesia Católica y los innumerables documentados abusos sexuales por parte del clero en muchos países prueba mi punto de vista. Y no estoy hablando de víctimas de abusos o los que fueron quemados en las hogueras y de quienes nunca supimos o sabremos nada. La pedofilia es local; no se evita o aprueba al nivel papal. Que un mensaje de paz y amor por parte de la cabeza de la Iglesia que clama ser el sucesor de Pedro puede ser mal interpretado y mal usado por los trabajadores en su esfera profesional para satisfacer sus apetitos enfermos lo hace más difícil de comprender a menos que lo consideremos una cuestión local. Ciertamente no es institucional.

T.E. Lawrence, el famoso Lawrence de Arabia, hizo una observación muy interesante en su famoso libro "Los Siete Pilares de la Sabiduría," © 1926, 1935 DoubleDay. Él encontraba muy significativo que las tres mayores religiones del mundo (Judía, Cristiana y Musulmana) habían tenido su origen en el desierto. Perdóñenme por esta conexión, pero ignorando lo ancho que sea el horizonte en un desierto, lo cierto es que todos los desiertos son locales. Y local también ha sido la resistencia de los creyentes al cierre de iglesias en Boston dictado por el Arzobispado. Locales son igualmente los retos y desafíos que encuentra la Iglesia Católica en América del Sur por parte de las iglesias protestantes que resuelven problemas y preocupaciones locales. Los pobres necesitan una mano, no una fantasía distante. Pero regresemos al nombramiento del Papa corriente.

A diferencia de la mayoría de los católicos, o antiguos católicos, no me sorprendió que este cónclave fuera tan corto. Es ahí que mi mente especulativa entra en acción. El Cardenal de Chicago Francis George, que participó en el concilio, dijo en una conferencia de prensa que "fue una elección muy clara desde el principio." Ahora bien, ¿por qué cree usted que dijo eso? ¿Qué sabía él que ni usted ni yo sabemos? Yo tengo mi teoría, una que tal vez no conoceremos hasta dentro de doscientos años, pero yo no espero estar por aquí para saberlo. Como se dice, la vida es corta. La respuesta, en mi opinión, reside no en el cónclave, sino en el período de tiempo que transcurrió desde que la salud del Papa Juan Pablo II comenzó a deteriorar; y eso fue hace mucho tiempo, inclusive antes de llegar a la conclusión de que sus días estaban contados.

Yo vi al Papa en persona en el año 2000 cuando mi esposa y yo asistimos a una de las audiencias semanales que el Papa ofrece cada miércoles en la Plaza de San Pedro. El papa Juan Pablo II lucía frágil y débil entonces, tenía problemas con el habla y la habilidad de moverse. Aunque no reconocido por la Iglesia hasta su muerte, el Sumo Pontífice sufría los serios efectos de la enfermedad de Parkinson. Recientemente leímos que aproximadamente al mismo tiempo de mi visita a Roma, el Papa estaba considerando renunciar a su puesto. No lo hizo. Pero una cosa es renunciar, la otra llegar al fin de las actividades diarias poco a poco; la Curia romana es una burocracia muy eficiente que puede funcionar sin el Papa, como lo hizo en el pasado, por mucho tiempo.

El Papa no está constantemente frente a sus fieles seguidores. Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Presidente de los Estados Unidos, estaba paralítico, pero nos lo escondieron por largo tiempo. Podemos ocultar la enfermedad del Papa ante los ojos de las gentes que lo ven a través de ojos nublados por las lágrimas de una fe que les impide ver la fragilidad y humanidad del hombre. ¿Estaba el Cardenal Ratzinger en efecto tras el telón? ¿Sería ese el comentario de "fue una elección muy clara desde el principio" que hizo el Cardenal Francis George? ¿Qué tiempo hace que este nuevo Papa ha sido realmente un viejo Papa? Como dije anteriormente, nunca lo sabremos, pero las advertencias del elegido que su papado pudiera ser corto dice mucho. Si eso fuera el caso, uno puede ver claramente por qué el Papa Juan Pablo II decidió quedarse en casa y rechazó tratamiento médico adicional en el hospital que hubiera resultado en una incapacidad absoluta y una lucha larga e interna por la sucesión a su posición.

Los comentaristas continúan preguntándose si van a haber cambios bajo este nuevo Papa, estoy seguro que muchos libros de expertos se preparan discutiendo el asunto. La Historia, sin embargo, sugiere que viene más de lo mismo. El mundo, a nivel local de un planeta industrializado, es más complicado que la vida en el desierto donde nuestras filosofías religiosas comenzaron. Esa realidad, y no otra, es la fuente del relativismo contra el que los Papas han estado luchando desde hace tiempo. Jesús fue un hombre joven que murió a la edad de treinta y tres años y fue símbolo de cambio y rebelión en su tiempo, no de continuidad. El que la Iglesia que reclama su herencia espiritual pueda cambiar y rebelarse contra sí misma con humildad o contra el resto del mundo materialista con tolerancia es pura especulación. Pero no lo es para mí. Y ese es mi punto de vista hoy.

El viernes, 29 de abril, 2005, el Adelante Youth Center llevó a cabo una cena para recaudar fondos para el Programa de School Success de Adelante y a la vez honrar el trabajo de su fundador, el Padre Joachim Lally.

A través de sus cuarenta años como sacerdote paulista, el Padre Lally ha trabajado incansablemente para ayudar a los necesitados y ha sido un constructor de puentes entre las comunidades por generaciones. Él ha servido en las Juntas Directivas de Mary Immaculate Health Care Services, Lawrence Family Development and Education Fund y Lawrence Family Development Charter School como agente fiduciario del fondo. El Padre Lally también se desenvolvió como sacerdote visitante de la Parroquia Saint Michael en North Andover, donde desarrolló una misión anual de jóvenes a la República Dominicana.

Joachim nació el 12 de diciembre de 1939, en Memphis, Tennessee. Cuando estaba en segundo grado se mudó para Kansas, donde en enero de 1955 se unió al Seminario Paulista. "Yo sentí la llamada al ministerio a la edad de 15 años, cuando estaba en el 10mo. Grado, hace 50 años", dice Lally.

En Arkansas trabajó en distintas posiciones mientras desarrollaba su educación. Él asistió a Subiaco Academy High School; Benedictine Abbey de Subiaco y en 1961 se graduó con un A.B. en Filosofía de Subiaco College. En 1966 recibió un MS en Consejería del Kansas State College. Fue ordenado Sacerdote Católico en Mayo de 1965.

En 1969 se trasladó a St. Louis, MO a la Parroquia de St. Henry como administrador de un personal de 10, donde fué co-fundador de una Clínica de Salud Gratuita del Hospital de la Universidad de St. Louis. En 1973, se movió hacia Michigan, donde realizó funciones de Capellán para

matrimonios católicos divorciados y/o separados en la Diócesis de Grand Rapids, entre otras responsabilidades.

En 1976 se radicó en Massachusetts, en el Centro Paulista de Boston. Donde fué co-fundador/presidente del Downtown Task Force Ministry (Ministerio de Acción Social) S.A.M. y también su co-director así como maestro de educación de adultos.

En 1989 la Ciudad de Lawrence, especialmente los niños, fue bendecida con el arribo del Padre Joachim Lally, el cual ha sido el fundador y creador del Adelante! Youth Center, originalmente establecido en el 365 de la calle Haverhill hasta que, en marzo del 2001, un fuego destruyó sus facilidades.

¡Adelante! fué fundado por el Padre Lally, C.S.P. como un centro de recreación para jóvenes. A principio de los 90, el Centro Adelante creció hasta convertirse en un programa no sectario, abierto a todos los jóvenes en la ciudad de Lawrence con énfasis en desarrollo académico y liderazgo.

¡Adelante! Tiene sus raíces en la comunidad latina y construye puentes para la juventud, proveyéndoles las oportunidades de ampliar su educación y el éxito económico como adultos. Estas oportunidades retan al joven a 'moverse hacia adelante', en lo personal, lo académico y en su empeño de servir con fines positivos en sus vidas.

"Adelante! Youth Center está desarrollando el futuro de los líderes de Lawrence y alienta a aquellos que han recibido becas de escuela superior, a que retornen a Lawrence como productivos hombres y mujeres de negocio, líderes cívicos y como ejemplo para otros jóvenes del vecindario", dijo Lauren Gray, directora ejecutiva de Adelante!

## FATHER LALLY HONORED!

On Friday, April 29th, 2005, the Adelante Youth Center held a dinner fundraiser to support the School Success Program at Adelante and to honor the work of its founder, Father Joachim Lally.

Through his 40 years as a Paulist Priest, Father Lally has worked tirelessly to help those in need and has been a bridge builder between communities for generations. He has served on the Board of Directors of Mary Immaculate Health Care Services, Lawrence Family Development and Education Fund and Lawrence Family Development Charter School as a Trustee of the Fund. Father Lally also served as a visiting priest at Saint Michael in North Andover, where he developed an annual youth mission to the Dominican Republic.

Born on December 12, 1939, in Memphis, Tennessee, Joachim's family moved to Arkansas while he was in second grade and that's where in January 1955 he joined the Paulist Seminary. "I felt a calling to the priesthood at age 15, when I was in the 10<sup>th</sup> grade, 50 years ago," said Lally.

In Arkansas he worked in different positions while developing his education. He attended Subiaco Academy High School; Benedictine Abbey of Subiaco and in 1961 he graduated with an A.B. in Philosophy from Subiaco College. In 1966, he received an MS in Guidance and Counseling from Kansas State College. He was ordained a Catholic Priest in May, 1965.

He moved to St. Louis, MO in 1969, to the St. Henry's Parish and Community Center where he was the in resident administrator with a staff of ten, and co-founder of a Free Health Clinic of the St. Louis University Hospital

Association. In 1973, he moved to Michigan where he was Chaplain for divorced and separated Catholics from the Grand Rapids Diocese, among other chores.


In 1976, he moved to Massachusetts, at the Paulist Center in Boston, where he was Co-Founder and Chairperson of the Downtown Task Force Ministry (Social Action Ministries, S.A.M.) and also its Co-Director, and adult education teacher.

In 1989 Lawrence was blessed, especially the children, with the arrival of Father Joachim Lally, where he was the Director/Founder of Adelante Youth Center, originally established at 365 Haverhill Street, until a fire destroyed its facilities on March 2001.

Adelante! (Spanish for "moving forward") was originally founded in 1992 by Fr. Joachim Lally, C.S.P. as a recreation center for teens. Adelante Youth Center grew in the early 90s to become a non-sectarian program, open to all youth in the City of Lawrence, with an evolving emphasis on academics and leadership development.

Adelante! has its roots in the Latino community and builds bridges for Lawrence Youth, providing them with opportunities to enhance their education and economic success as adults. These opportunities challenge youth to "move forward" personally, academically, in their commitment to service, and toward positive life choices.

"Adelante! Youth Center is Developing Lawrence's Future Leaders and encourages its high school scholarship recipients to return to Lawrence as productive business and civic leaders and as role models for other neighborhood youth", said Lauren Gray, Adelante! Executive Director.





## YOUNG MISSIONARIES BRING GOOD NEWS AND HELPING HANDS TO DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

**P**aulist Father Joachim Lally lives in Good Shepherd Parish in New York City, but if you want to find him in February or July, head south to the Dominican Republic. For more than 20 years, Lally has been working with immigrant youth, first in Boston and now in New York, to draw them into community, to teach them how to reach out to others and to form leaders for the future.

At the heart of this ministry is Misión Joven Dominicana, founded in 1989 "to provide U.S. Hispanic youth with a new window on the gospel message." Last July, on the 21st mission, Lally and seven young adults left New York City for an island still reeling from the flash flood that smashed into Haiti on May 24, and sent refugees pouring across the border into the Dominican Republic. The New Yorkers were met by 30 youth from the D.R. who had been taught and formed during earlier missions and who work there with full-time coordinator Tony Gonzalez.

After a two-day retreat, the missionaries headed for four different towns to build a chapel, to evangelize, to prepare people for baptism and to console the grieving refugees who had lost homes and families. Joanny Corsino was one of the young adults on the mission. "Our main job was to let them know that we were carrying their burden as well," she writes. "We were there to lift up their spirits." In listening to the stories of suffering and hope, Corsino experienced her own conversion. "The more I spoke with the community the more I realized that I had something of my own that needed to be healed. I asked God for a lot of forgiveness, [and now] things at home are very different. I went to lift the spirits of the Jimani community but in the end it was I which was in need of a real lift in my heart."

Lally has seen this happen before to kids from New York and Boston





## Sullivan running on his record

This is an election year in Lawrence but it almost looks as if Mayor Michael J. Sullivan is not running for re-election. He is very quiet as if he could be elected again in the fall by just running on his construction record.

The few times Mayor Sullivan has spoken publicly, it has been to brag about the new high school, the transportation center, the water plant, so many new homes being built, etc. While it is true that many diehards (Latinos or Anglos) have made up their minds years ago as to whom they want in office and don't want to be convinced through logic, the construction record is not enough to get anyone elected.

Mayor Sullivan has shown a very poor record in dealing with many important areas of interest to many residents such as not taking measures to correct the situation at the Office of Planning and Development until it was too late and the Housing and Urban Development Department had to get involved.

For the past two and one half years, Rumbo has been banned from the schools and the school department yet, the mayor's reaction has been not to micromanage the school department thus allowing the school superintendent to violate our constitutional right of freedom of the press and freedom of expression.

His weakness in dealing with the School Committee is notorious. As Chairman, he should have been able to demand that Carlos Ramos come clean on whether or not he lives in the district he represents instead of adopting the arrogant attitude of "Where I live is nobody's business." Laura Vanderveer thinks the School Committee is a private club where she can come in and out as she pleases, maintaining an atrocious attendance record.

Let's not forget that the School Committee went without a vice president for many months and the mayor couldn't find consensus among the members to select a replacement when Michael Sweeney left. It took for the mayor to be away and the Council President Patrick Blanchette to run the meeting to get them to agree on one.

The mayor also failed to take action with the disaster that is the Department of Public Works that has been steadily documented by Rumbo through the years. The deplorable working conditions in the City Yard with holes on the roof, getting wet when it rains. Workers are forced to breathe hazardous waste collected in the yard for months at a time and in the winter they work 24-hour shifts during snow storms in trucks with no heating. Andrea Traficanti's salary alone could be better used in purchasing a truck every year and she won't be missed.

The handling of the cable television contract and the public access television station was a clear sign that Mayor Sullivan avoids controversies and doing the right thing.

For over two years, many people have been advising the mayor as to the future of Channel 8, the Public Access Channel. There was no lack of information and knowledge provided to him in order to continue using this channel to bring education and entertainment to our residents but the mayor chose to ignore them. Last November, the Cable Advisory

Commission placed on their meeting agenda discussing the cable contract only to find that the mayor had signed it the week before. Another insignificant board since Mayor Sullivan couldn't care less about their opinion or suggestions. He even dismissed recommendations by City Attorney Charles Boddy regarding the contract and leasing space to set up the television studio. Advice he got plenty; he listened to the wrong people.

It all came to a halt on February 28 when Comcast finally locked us out of their Glenn St. studios. Two months have passed; there is no studio and no plans to find a suitable space to build one.

Mayor Sullivan could very easily blame the Mickey Mouse board of directors that he formed for a non-profit organization back in October - the Lawrence Community Access Television (LCAT) - to handle channels 8 and 22. It is not my intent to be disrespectful to Mickey Mouse but this group was put together by using people at hand without giving much thought to whether they had a real interest in seeing it through. With the exception of Mike Garrity, a volunteer at St. Patrick's Church who videotapes their services and interview programs for broadcast on Channel 8, no one else has anything invested in its success.

Jorge De Jesus, the mayor's aide nervously washes his hands every time he is asked if there is anything new on that issue. Eli Bernabe, Human Resources Assistant at City Hall also could not answer my questions. "I was recruited for that board and I am not responsible for the decisions being made," she responded by telephone.

I have news for her: Being a member of that board, she is responsible for the decisions made - even if she was not consulted. It is up to her to demand why decisions are made without ever holding a meeting.

Victor Abramson told me that he is ready to resign because he doesn't want to be used by just having his name on that roster.

But it is an election year. Channel 8 could be used to educate and inform the public about candidates and issues. Not having a studio makes it too difficult to produce programming of that sort for the volunteers with minimal experience in television production or technical expertise.

Can you get it? It's very convenient to keep Channel 8 under the control of a totalitarian regime such as the school department. This was precisely what my previous articles were trying to prevent. Mayor Sullivan can now say that LCAT is in charge without necessarily placing blame on the school department. His inaction was instead a calculated move.

# A new Pope appointed?

It was Thomas P. O'Neill better known as Tip, the famous Massachusetts Congressman and Speaker of the House, who said that all politics is local. I agree. I also believe that all religion is local. Please allow me to elaborate.

The election of a new Pope these days, certainly not in less media-driven times of the past, is one of those universal events that combine grief and joy rolled into one. First his flock suffers with the distress and emptiness of the loss of the familiar and right after it is announced that a new man has been appointed, the feeling is replaced with the happiness of knowing that there is a successor after all. It is the old "the king is dead, long live the king" syndrome.

The pageantry and circumstance and yes, the pomp, surrounding the elaborate funeral services and the mystery of the conclave where the College of Cardinals elects the new head of the Church of Rome adds additional magic to the event. That we concentrate for hours on the color of smoke emanating from a chimney in St. Peter's Square simply adds an air of secrecy, wonder and entertainment to the tradition.

We speculate *ad infinitum* about who is going to be selected, actually not a difficult betting experience when you come to think of it. After all, the Pope is chosen by and amongst a small group of the current Cardinals not exceeding one hundred and twenty. One out of 120 represents good odds. Selection of leaders of democratic societies takes place in an air of uncertainty, the results not known until the rough and tumble of the electoral process is over. We are quite sure of the succession to the English throne: It is called lineage. We can argue back and forth whether Prince Charles or one of his children will ascend to the position next, but the choice is quite limited. Not with a Pope: the candidates are few and so will be the chosen.

I have left out the myriad of little tyrants in the secular world who are still or have been still in power in history because we know they got there due to certain conditions that made it possible, Cuba's

Castro a good tragic example, and were supported afterwards by their cunning abilities and by those who surround them for selfish purposes. But a Pope is different.

The history of the Papacy has not only been long, but also turbulent. The bar raised by Pope John Paul II is quite high indeed. Others were not as concerned about that bar or as ambitious, perhaps their goals more mundane. We only have to list the many crusades and the Inquisition to consider some of them. Many of the heretic rebellions of the early years of the millennium just ended accused the Pope of being the Antichrist, the Roman hierarchy his henchmen. Fire gutted many European churches and basilicas that the mobs believed were the temple of the devil, not the shrines of the blessed. Many of the Catholic schisms of the Middle Age that now go by a respectable religious name in our midst, started as an insurrection against the Popes of the times or the policies they represented.

I am always puzzled by the pundits and hopefuls who argue back and forth about the philosophical and theological orientation of a new Papacy. The discussion revolves around "change." To believe that a new Pope can even consider the possibility of changing basic theological and dogmatic policies that brought him there in the first place and were the main reason for the separation of the believers through the ages is absurd. The Catholic Church, like any dogmatic faith, is a slow train that has traveled a long rail of two thousand years oblivious to the accusations or change aspirations of those on the side of the track who think different. Why should it change now? I ask. Why ever? It is better to move elsewhere if we disagree. To use a secular example: Republicans or Democrats who would like to change the philosophy of their parties to the ideas of the other should simply jump fences.

Earlier I said that religion is local. The low number of new religious vocations of both genders in the Catholic Church and the documented number of clergy sexual abuses exposed recently in many countries of the world proves my point. And I am not even thinking about those abuses or burnings at the stakes we never knew about. Pedophilia is local; is not condoned avoided or stopped by a Pope. That a message of peace and love by the head of the Church who claims to be a follower and successor of Peter can be

misinterpreted and misused by the workers in the field to satisfy their sick urges makes it harder to comprehend unless we localize it. Institutional it isn't.

But the reason for my "local" portrayal is more fundamental. T.E. Lawrence, the famous Lawrence of Arabia, made an interesting observation in his famous book "Seven Pillars of Wisdom," © 1926, 1935 Doubleday, that "he found it more than coincidental that all three major religions of the world (Jewish, Christian and Muslim) had their origins in the desert." Pardon me for this connection, but regardless of how wide is the horizon in a desert all of them are local. And local has been the resistance of the believers to the closing of many churches in Boston dictated by the Diocese. Local are as well the challenges that the Catholic Church faces in South America by local Protestant churches who deal with local problems and concerns. The poor need a hand, not some distant imagery. But let's get back to the appointment of the current Pope.

Unlike most Catholics, or former Catholics, I was not surprised to see such a fast conclave process this time. This is where my traditional speculative mind gets into high gear. Chicago Cardinal Francis George, who participated in the conclave that elected the new pope, said in a press conference, "It was a choice that was clear almost from the beginning." Now, why do you think he said that? What does he know that you and I don't? I have my theory, one that we may know some time two hundred years from now, but I don't expect to stick around waiting for it. As they say, life is too short. The answer, in my opinion, lies not in the conclave itself, but in the period of time since Pope John Paul II's health started to deteriorate; and that was a long time ago, even before we came to realize that his days were over.

I saw the Pope in person in the year 2000 when my wife and I attended one of the weekly Wednesday audiences the Popes offer at St. Peter's Square. Pope John Paul looked fragile and feeble then, having problems with his speech and his ability to move. While unacknowledged by the Church until his passing, the Pontiff suffered the serious effects of Parkinson's disease. We read that the Pope, right about the same time of my trip to Rome, was considering resignation from his post. He

didn't. But one thing is to resign, another to come to a grinding halt in your activities little by little; the Curia in Rome is a highly efficient bureaucracy that could function without a Pope, as it did many times in the past, for a long time.

And the Pope is not always in front of his followers. Franklin Delano Roosevelt's paralysis was hidden from us for a long time. We could hide the infirmity of a Pope for quite a while before folks who see him through clouded teary eyes of faith can gauge the fragility and humanity in the man. Was Cardinal Ratzinger in effect the Pope behind the stage? Was that "choice clear almost from the beginning" what Cardinal Francis George was talking about? How long has this "new" Pope been really an "old" Pope? As I said, we may never find out, but the warning of the man himself that his new papacy could be a short run speaks volumes. If that was the case, one can see quite clearly why Pope John Paul II chose to stay in his room and refuse further medical treatment that might have resulted in his absolute incapacitation and a behind the scene struggle for succession.

The pundits keep wondering and arguing whether there will be changes or not under this new Papacy, books on the way I bet. History indicates that more of the same is coming. The world, at the local level of an ever increasing industrialized world, is more complicated than the deserts where our religious beliefs according to T. E. Lawrence started. That reality, and no other, is the source of the new relativism that the Popes have been struggling with. Jesus was a young man who died at the age of 33 and he was all about change and rebellion, not constancy. Whether the Church that claims to carry his legacy can change or rebel against itself with humility, or the rest of a materialistic world with tolerance, in order to carry on his message with success is anybody's guess. But not mine. And that is my Point of View today.

Friday morning, the Mayor met with Congressman Meehan and spoke about the parking garage. "Congressman Meehan has done a wonderful job of updating the other members about the need for a parking garage and the need for river dredging."

Fiorentini also met with Congressman John Tierney who represents Amesbury and Newburyport to update him on the need to dredge the river in Haverhill and in Amesbury and Newburyport.

"This was a very productive series of meetings. I know that our Congressional delegation and Senators will do what they can to assist us. Getting a parking facility is going to involve putting together a group of interested players—the Federal government, the State and local business interests. We are committed to making it happen," concluded Mayor Fiorentini.

## Statement of Marcos Devers addressing Sullivan attack

### "Mayor's Desperate Cheap Shots at Devers are a Disservice to the City"

On Friday, April 22, 2005, Lawrence Mayor Michael Sullivan issued a press release, entitled "A Record to be Proud Of", in which he accused me of being politically motivated in my attempts, along with others, to assist a group of Lawrence businessmen who are in the middle of a code enforcement dispute with the Sullivan Administration. The mayor's press release is yet another example of a sign that the mayor does not know what he is talking about. Under the guise of detailing his proud record on human rights in our city, he could not cite one substantive accomplishment.

First, he demonstrates a complete lack of understanding of what a public official's job is all about. As an at-large city councilor for the last six years in Lawrence, my constituents are every resident in this great city. I have spent six years building bridges of understanding between all groups in our city - Anglo and Latino alike. During the

controversy with the businessmen, I have striven at all times to seek out the facts. Not once have I engaged in finger pointing to prematurely assess blame.

As part of my job, I receive phone calls from people complaining about or questioning something going on in our city. I attend hundreds of meetings each year throughout our neighborhoods and amongst various citizens groups helping to improve our city. Often these meetings are used to resolve various problems that have arisen between our residents and the municipal government they pay the taxes to fund. In every instance, I listen fully to what people have to say and assess whether there is a legitimate issue to be addressed. Sometimes there has been a lack of proper communication from this administration, leaving residents with many misunderstandings. As an elected city councilor in this city, the most important function I have is to communicate with my constituents and figure out how to address their concerns. After all, they are paying the bills. It is unfortunate that the mayor views talking with constituents to determine the facts as something that is "politically motivated", rather than seeing it as what it really is - good due diligence.

Secondly, the mayor's recent actions, leaving the meeting with these businessmen last week without saying a word to address their concerns, shows a complete lack of respect and common courtesy for those businessmen. One of my jobs as a councilor is to listen to people and have a dialogue with them. Sometimes I may not agree with them, but I also respect their opinion and, more importantly, their right to express that opinion. The mayor apparently has a different take on public service.

And thirdly, with his actions he demonstrates his own incompetence as mayor. As I have stated before, the mayor needed to show his desire and commitment to listen to complaints by the businessmen and formulate corrective measures to solve the controversy or, since he left, having one of his city department heads to present a solution in his absence. A competent mayor would seek to match the services of department heads with the citizens who have questions about what government is doing.

If the mayor wants to engage in a policy of "see no evil and hear no evil", then that is his prerogative. To me, that is a policy of failure. As for his self-proclaimed "record to be proud of", his policies have done nothing but exacerbate a sensitive situation due to his lack of respect for his constituents, his lack of understanding about our jobs as elected officials, and his lack of competency in his abilities to run this city.

As I try to build One City with One Vision, the Sullivan Administration is not a record I will be modeling my efforts on.

## NECC Releases New Report On the Latino Community of Lawrence

The Institute for Community and Workforce Development (ICWD) at Northern Essex Community College (NECC) has just released a new report entitled "The Making of Community: Latinos in Lawrence, Massachusetts." Funded by the College's Community and Enterprise Development Center, this two-year project combined the experiences and talents of Latino scholars in a variety of community issues including housing, community and economic development,

education, politics, migration patterns, and much information from the U.S. Census.

Mayte Rivera, the director of the Community and Enterprise Development Center, notes that the "team of scholars have created what amounts to a community blueprint," and that her center "will mold the author's emerging lessons in the design and delivery of its services."

The co-editors of the report, Dr. Jorge Santiago, associate professor and director of the ICWD, and Dr. James Jennings,

professor at Tufts University, make clear in the report that "although there is much poverty in Lawrence, there are also many potential opportunities that can help improve the economic lives of families and children in the city."

The introduction to the report, written by Santiago and Jennings, outlines the findings of the report. These include the need for the city and others to take note of the abundance of assets the Latino community provides for the city; the need for genuine resident involvement and participation to tap into the Latino community's potential; the need to make sure that any research about public policies and initiatives that impact Latinos must have a strong basis of practical application in the community; the need to acknowledge and tap into the enormous potential wealth in the Latino community and Lawrence; and the opportunity for Northern Essex Community College to expand its work and services to the Latino community by expanding educational opportunities, and consider a range of pedagogies to accomplish such. "This report has a wealth of information that will be useful to just about any one who lives and/or works in Lawrence," notes Dr. Santiago. He further adds, "I think its relevancy and usefulness will extend well into the future."

# Women's Studies Celebrates Anniversary

That was the opening line used by Lawrence City Councilor Dr. Nilka Alvarez-Rodriguez with her usual good sense of humor, when she was invited to talk at a luncheon held in celebration of the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Women's Studies Program at Merrimack College, where she is adjunct professor.

Her theme was, "The difficulty women face in local politics; The myth of perfect beauty; Women and aging; and Latina women and organizing."

Nilka's trajectory from her family's poverty in New York and her father's suicide at the age of nine, to the Community Caucus on the Status of Women, the National Congress of Neighborhood Women and later working with the United Nations on women's issues qualified her to be the guest speaker.

Her work with the National Congress of Neighborhood Women made it possible for some members to attend the Beijing, China Women's Conference. "I did not attend the conference because I knew that those who went could learn and get more out of it than me," she explained to the audience with pride.

In 1998 Nilka moved to Lawrence, Massachusetts with her husband Richard Rodriguez and two teenage sons and in 1999 she was elected to the Lawrence City

Council.

"While my opponent was going around complaining about trash, dirt and the deplorable conditions of the city, I talked about hope and fixing the problems," said Nilka. "Generally, people want to be inspired."

The first thing she did was create a Youth in Government Council made up of students of the four high school serving Lawrence. She also established a neighborhood coalition of community leaders who were not talking to each other. From that, she wrote the designation letter that was sent to Washington, D.C. and later became the Weed and Seed Program, which she considers is the achievement of her vision. From her position in the Council, Councilor Alvarez-Rodriguez has been able to work with the Office of Planning and Development regarding housing, vacant lots, etc., but she knew that her focus would have to be drug-related and it took a multi-level approach working with Greater Lawrence Family Health Center.

There were audience questions regarding cultural barriers encountered by Latinas and she referenced a story she uses in her classroom about the eagle that was raised among chickens. When the eagle grew up and was told that he was not a

chicken, he didn't know what to do or how to behave and he had to learn all that. She then asks her students to write their interpretation of the story and surprisingly enough, many compare it to their own lives; they even see the farmer as their father.

"But the Spanish-speaking community is moving away from electing Latinas," she explained. "We are looking for quality women to represent us. You'll be surprised what you can accomplish when you overcome appearance and skin color and work together with people. Now's the time for young people to motivate this action," she urged the students in the audience.



Gordene MacKenzie, director of Women's Studies at Merrimack College introduced Dr. Nilka Alvarez-Rodriguez as the guest speaker. She also awarded certificates of recognition to Dr. Elaine Donovan, founder of Women's Studies and Dr. Marie Plasse, Advisory Board member, for doing the groundwork for Women's Studies.



For the past seven years, Councilor Alvarez-Rodriguez has organized a Women's Symposium bringing together women of every nationality and educational background to discuss current issues, providing education and again, hope.



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

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

## Mayor Announces Haverhill High School Renovation Project is Ahead of Schedule and Under Budget



Haverhill Mayor James J. Fiorentini announced that the Haverhill High School renovation project is ahead of schedule and coming in under budget. After signing contracts for two major phases of the project, replacing the existing heating system and renovating eighteen science classrooms and labs, the Mayor announced that the total project is nearly 3 million dollars under budget and a couple of months ahead of schedule.

Mayor Fiorentini accepted a bid for complete replacement of the school's heating system that comes in roughly \$2.4 million under budget. The contract has been awarded to Francis H. Maroney, Inc., a Haverhill-based heating and plumbing company. The budget originally allotted \$9 million for this phase of the project, but Mayor Fiorentini accepted Maroney's bid of \$6.6 million.

"On this contract agreement: the city saves money and the work goes to a Haverhill-based contractor," commented Mayor Fiorentini. The Mayor also signed a contract agreement for \$2.9 million for renovation of 18 science rooms and laboratories, coming in lower than the originally anticipated budgeted amount of \$3.5 million.

The mayor also announced that the project of replacing the windows at Haverhill High School is now two months ahead of schedule. This phase of the renovation project, which also met

and did not exceed the budgeted amount of \$1.7 million, will be completed in the beginning of July. Originally, the city expected the work to be completed in August of 2005. When work is completed, new thermally insulated windows and triple weather-stripped aluminum doors will have been installed. According to the City's architect Kevin Buckley, of KBA Architects, these windows and doors should last about 30 years. Thus far, the project has been extremely successful, according to the Mayor.

The construction project to rebuild the main entrance of the high school and make it handicapped accessible came in \$75,000 under budget and was completed in September of last year. This project also included the addition of a handicapped lift to the auditorium stage.

"Our high school is a fully accredited high school, and we are totally committed to keeping it that way. Our high school renovation project is \$3 million under budget, and two months ahead of schedule. Last week's successful land auction put it within our reach, for the very first time, to fund this project, at least for the next several years. Within the next several weeks, I will ask the city council to put aside a portion of the proceeds from the sale of land to guarantee that our high school project will remain accredited and funded."

our students face financial and academic challenges in the pursuit of a college education. The PACE grant helps us to provide these students with the extra services they need to succeed at Northern Essex and transfer to continue their education. We are thrilled and proud to receive this grant funding for an additional five years and we thank Congressman Meehan and the rest of our congressional delegation in Washington, D.C. for the advocacy role they played in securing this grant for the college."

The Department of Education's TRIO Student Support Services encourages students to stay in school and teaches them that a higher education will provide a better opportunity for success in the U.S. job market. The program supports projects to increase the retention and graduation rate of low-income and first generation college students, and college students with disabilities.

Despite its importance to communities like Lowell, the TRIO program is in danger of being cut from the budget. President Bush's budget request for FY 2006 eliminates all funding for TRIO. Congressman Meehan is part of a growing coalition of bipartisan members of Congress who are joining to oppose these cuts to TRIO and expand the program to reach more high school students.

Middlesex Community College will continue the student support services program that have provided tutoring, academic advising, and skill-building services to low-income and first generation college students since 1993, and to students with disabilities since 2000. Middlesex will receive \$296,371 to fund its programs that serve approximately 200 low income and first generation students. Students are eligible for the services based on their families' taxable income. A student from a family of four would be eligible if the taxable household income is less than \$29,025. The remaining \$228,843 will be used for the services that Middlesex provides to approximately 100 disabled college students.

For over twenty-five years, Northern Essex Community College has provided the Pathways to Academic and Career Excellence Project (PACE), which provides academic support services to increase retention, graduation, and transfers to four-year institutions for first generation, low income and disabled college students. Each year approximately 250 students benefit from Northern Essex's PACE program, receiving professional and peer tutoring, academic and transfer advising, mentoring and personal support. Over its twenty-five years of service, the PACE program has consistently exceeded its objectives, with 75% of the 4500 students that the program has served graduating and/or transferring to four year colleges and universities.

## Lantigua legislation seeks funding for local non-profits, tech center, public safety

State Representative William Lantigua (D-Lawrence) has filed 12 amendments to the fiscal 2006 state budget. If adopted, the majority of these amendments would benefit local non-profit organizations.

"I continue to fight hard for Lawrence," Lantigua said. "Although as a body we're going to be advocating for issues that affect the entire Commonwealth – like health care, education, senior citizens – non-profits are the lifeblood of every community. They're very important to me."

Nine of the 12 amendments request funding for community service organizations based in Lawrence: Arlington Neighborhood Association, \$145,000; Casa Dominicana, \$125,000; Dominican American Voting Council, \$45,000; Family Services of Lawrence, \$135,000; Food for the World Pantry, \$53,000; Lawrence Learning Center and Community Development, \$105,000; Neighbors in Need, \$125,000; New England Puerto Rican Association, \$125,000; and Our House Family

Learning Center, \$1 million. Lantigua again filed a proposal to acquire \$7.5 million for expansion of the Northern Essex Community College Technology Center.

Lantigua also has sought to enhance public safety by requesting \$200,000 for the Lawrence Fire Department and, in an amendment co-sponsored by Rep. David Torrisi of North Andover and Rep. Barry Finegold of Andover, a grant award of \$100,000 for community policing efforts.

Once the House of Representatives has decided which amendments to approve, its budget proposal will be sent to the Senate for further debate. Amendments endorsed by the Senate will then be forwarded to a joint budget conference committee.

Lantigua said he hopes all his amendments are adopted, but acknowledged that he and his colleagues face difficult decisions in the weeks ahead. "Everyone wants his or her community to benefit, but there's only so much money to go around," he said.

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**Internationally known photographer Dawoud Bey's class pictures to include Phillips Academy and Lawrence high students**

Bey returns to Phillips academy as part of its artist-in-resident program

Internationally renowned photographer Dawoud Bey is returning to Phillips Academy May 2 - 16 as part of the school's Edward E. Elson Artist-in-Residence Program. Bey will be photographing and working with students at Lawrence High School to include in his on-going book project, *Class Pictures*. In a previous visit in April, Bey photographed and met with students from Phillips Academy.

Bey's respect for and sincere interest in high school students led him to the *Class Pictures* project which highlights the individuality and commonalities among teens across the country. Striving to create a compelling and significant contemporary portrait of American youth in its various social and human dimensions, Bey describes his work as a way to bring a social aspect into the aesthetic realm and to give voice to those who do not usually have one. The project features photographs of high school students from around the country accompanied by their self-authored texts. Bey has already photographed and interviewed a diverse group of students from Chicago, Detroit, New York and Orlando and will continue the project by photographing high school students in New York and San Francisco.

"Knowing that teens are most often talked about around social issues – such drug or alcohol abuse, teen pregnancy, or gang activity – his insightful portraits

combining image and writing allow the teens to speak for themselves, often providing surprisingly sensitive portrayals of this otherwise targeted or neglected group," said Julie Bernson, Director of Education at the Addison Gallery. "Bey's frank discussions with art and English classes demonstrate his career-long interest in giving a face and voice to marginalized groups who are not often represented in art museums and galleries. He serves as an inspiration to students to pursue their passions and commit themselves to acting on the injustices they see in the world around them."

Born in Queens, NY in 1953, Bey's interest in photography began at the age of 15 when he saw "Harlem On My Mind", an exhibition including works by African American photographer James VanDerZee. The experience inspired Bey to create his first photographic series, *Harlem, USA*. Realizing that photography and life as an artist was his calling, he enrolled in classes at the School of Visual Arts and later completed a BA in photography at Empire State College, New York in 1990. He received a MFA in photography from Yale University in 1993. A 2002 Guggenheim Fellow, Dawoud Bey is currently Professor of Photography at Columbia College in Chicago. His work is exhibited in numerous galleries and museums around the country and in Europe and Japan.

Bey's book, *Class Pictures*, will be published by Aperture. In addition to being included in the book, the students' photographs and writing will be included in a traveling exhibition.

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
