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



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

La Ciudad de Lawrence canceló la Academia de Policía que planeaba comenzar la semana pasada cuando descubrieron que la ciudad no tiene dinero. Nueve hombres que renunciaron a sus empleos para convertirse en policías ahora se encuentran desempleados y muy enojados.

Al Concejal Jorge Gonzalez's se le cayó su teléfono al suelo y cuando se inclinó a recogerlo, el Concejal Nuncio Demarca le mostró que él tiene uno más moderno y debe cambiarlo por uno igual.

El Concejal Gonzalez dijo, "No, yo no quiero estar en Rumbo. Yo prefiero este porque es mío y yo lo pago."

Cuando lo alabé por no tener un teléfono pagado por los contribuyentes de la ciudad, el Concejal Nick Kolofoles se puso defensivo explicando que él usa su teléfono para asuntos de sus constituyentes solamente y el Concejal DiMarca trataba de hablar por encima de Nick explicando la forma en que él lo usa también. 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Alumnos de Notre Dame Defienden a maestro y compañeros suspendidos

Sin importarles que la decisión de realizar una protesta en apoyo a sus compañeros de clases le trajera graves consecuencias, varios alumnos de la Escuela Notre Dame se congregaron en el patio de la misma para protestar por lo que ellos consideran una injusticia y una exageración de los administradores de dicha entidad académica.

Los alumnos como una muestra de solidaridad y de apoyo con sus compañeros de clases, estudiantes se manifestaron el pasado miércoles portando carteles que exigían el regreso a clases de varios alumnos que fueron suspendidos y hoy enfrentan cargos criminales luego de redactar una nota en la cual amenazaban con quitarle la vida a varios maestros, compañeros de clases y religiosas del centro académico.

De igual manera los estudiantes exigían también el retorno del profesor Bob Kniffin, entrenador del equipo de béisbol de la escuela, a quien según ellos las autoridades escolares culpan del hecho, ya que cuatro de los seis acusados pertenecen al equipo de béisbol que dirige.

La protesta se realizó de manera pacífica y ordenada, a la entrada de la escalinata de una de las puertas que dan acceso a la escuela, en la parte trasera de la misma.

Tanto la administración de la escuela como las autoridades judiciales han manifestado que no van a permitir que casos como este ocurran en la ciudad. Sin embargo, tanto los acusados como sus propios compañeros han expresado que la redacción de la nota fue simplemente una travesura, a la que se le está dando demasiada importancia.

DETALLES DEL CASO

El pasado 11 de mayo la secretaría de la escuela Notre Dame encontró encima de su escritorio una nota acompañada de una lista con nombres de algunos maestros, alumnos y monjas del centro.

De acuerdo a la versión policial la noche anterior luego de un partido amistoso entre el equipo de pelota de la escuela y de Malden Catholic High School, seis estudiantes penetraron al interior de la institución académica y dejaron la nota en el escritorio de la secretaria.

La policía acusó formalmente a José Vargas y Kevin Valentín ambos de 18 años de edad de invasión a la propiedad y cometer felonía.

La nota elaborada dice: "People I want 2 kill" y además se leían las palabras: Death, God y la cifra 666 el que se refiere a Satanás.

Junto a Vargas y Valentín otros cuatro estudiantes han sido acusados, aunque los nombres de estos últimos se omiten por su condición de menores de edad, aunque al menos uno de ellos y quien tiene 16 años de edad enfrenta cargos de felonía y de amenaza de muerte.

En las últimas semanas tanto en escuelas de esta ciudad como en Methuen han tenido que ser evacuadas tanto por haberse encontrado notas similares a la encontrada

en Notre Dame, por intimidaciones de colocación de bombas, hechos que han sido determinados como bromas de mal gusto.

La pasada semana mientras se impartían las pruebas de MCAS los estudiantes de la escuela superior de Methuen tuvieron que ser evacuados luego de recibir una amenaza de bomba.

Asimismo, el mismo día en que se encontró la nota en Notre Dame, un estudiante de 15 años de la Escuela Superior de Methuen fue acusado de detonar una bomba casera entre los árboles de la escuela y de llevar consigo materiales para fabricar un explosivo.

REACCIÓN DE LOS ESTUDIANTES EN TORNO AL HECHO

No obstante a que el día de la protesta algunos miembros del centro educativo no permitieron que la prensa se acercara a los alumnos para conocer sus impresiones sobre este hecho, los jóvenes se la ingenieran para manifestar su rechazo a la decisión de la escuela y manifestar que al caso se le ha dado mucha importancia ya que sus compañeros solo estaban haciendo una broma y que en ningún momento pretendían llevar a cabo lo expresado en su nota.

Durante las horas de la protesta uno de los miembros del plantel educativo al percatarse que uno de los alumnos ofrecía declaraciones sobre el incidente y la protesta a María González reportera de Univisión 27, dijo que esto le costaría una suspensión.

HABLA LA MADRE DE JOSÉ VARGAS

La señora Lourdes Vargas que estuvo en el área del patio de la escuela al momento de la protesta expresó que su hijo al igual que los otros estudiantes son jóvenes buenos, incapaces de cometer un acto como el que aparece en la nota.

Al preguntársele su opinión sobre la protesta de los alumnos dijo que quizás tenía la mejor de las intenciones y que agradecía el apoyo que estaban manifestando a su hijo.

"Esperamos que pronto todo se aclare

porque ahora esos muchachos están en la casa, sin poder asistir a la escuela y arrepentidos de la travesura que hicieron", afirmó.

Ella dijo que los estudiantes son buenos muchachos, incapaces de realizar un acto de esa índole.

Luego del hecho los acusados fueron detenidos y dejados en libertad exentos del pago de una fianza, pero se les prohibió el acercarse al área de la escuela y de las personas que mencionan en la lista encontrada.

Los jóvenes comparecieron ante un juez de la Corte del Distrito del Condado de Essex de esta ciudad la mañana de este miércoles, 30 de mayo.

Su abogado defensor es Louis Farrah III, quien se apersonó a las inmediaciones del patio de la institución educativa al momento de la protesta de los alumnos.

Por otro lado las autoridades escolares están llevando a cabo una investigación para determinar si realmente Valentín entró al sistema de la computadora de la escuela y cambió los grados, según un reporte policial.

Mientras Vargas a quien se le imputa ser el autor intelectual de la supuesta broma enfrenta cargos de amenaza de muerte.

Una coalición de agencias de servicios sociales está dando la bienvenida a la comunidad en el desarrollo de los servicios para un nuevo programa comunitario. Este evento titulado: "La Comunidad Se Preocupa", fue el primer evento comunitario creado y enfocado en el vecindario para el modelo "PATCH".

El modelo PATCH representa un cambio de organización en una visión de servicios sociales. Una determinada agencia enfocada en a las necesidades de la comunidad. El modelo PATCH envuelve la voz y la opinión de los residentes de la comunidad y su vecindario para estos servicios.

A través de este evento tuvimos la oportunidad de hablar con los residentes locales sobre situaciones de importancia y las necesidades de ellos en su vecindario, y cómo dirigirlos en las mismas. Más de 60 adultos y jóvenes participaron en este evento.

La meta es obtener miembros de la comunidad para que se envuelvan socios iguales de las agencias de servicios sociales y obtener una voz fuerte, que decida que es lo mejor para su vecindario. Muchas comunidades basadas en una misma estrategia serán envueltas en este proyecto que tomará dirección del Comité Residencial, Comité del Vecindario, Comité de Padres y el Comité Juvenil.

Este programa es en conjunto entre Lawrence/Methuen Community Coalition, Community Day Care, TAM Iglesia Presbiteriana, el Departamento de Servicios Sociales y el Greater Lawrence Community Action Council, Inc. cual es la agencia oficial para el proyecto PATCH.

SOBRE LA NUEVA OFICINA

La nueva oficina está localizada en la TAM Iglesia Presbiteriana, en el 96 de la East Haverhill Street, en el área de Prospect Hill en la Ciudad de Lawrence. Es la tercera oficina que ha sido desarrollada en el estado de Massachusetts.

El concepto de PATCH es crear una comunidad que se sientan dueños de su comunidad, esperanza, la autodeterminación y el orgullo de la comunidad donde están seguros para que los niños y las familias tengan futuros significativos con la colaboración y la responsabilidad mutua. La oficina alcanzará esta meta promoviendo el poder y la implicación de los miembros de la comunidad que buscan ayuda.

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
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Verizon busca aprobación de licencia en Lawrence

Por más de un año la compañía Verizon ha estado negociando con la ciudad de Lawrence para la aprobación de una licencia que le permitirá trasmisir señales de video a todas las residencias de la ciudad y presentarse como una alternativa al servicio que hoy día ofrece Comcast.

Uno de los pasos finales para poder lograr su objetivo, fue presentarse ante una audiencia pública que se llevó a cabo el pasado 24 de mayo del presente año en el Lawrence Senior Center. Alrededor de veinte personas asistieron a la reunión que fue dirigida por el Abogado de la Ciudad Charles Boddy. También estuvo presente Alcalde de la Ciudad Michael J. Sullivan y el Director de Desarrollo Económico Thomas Schiavone. Representando a Verizon en las conversaciones estaban Peter T. Bowma y Jim McGrail.

En esta reunión se hizo público el interés de la ciudad de proveerle una licencia de diez años a Verizon para que pueda ofrecer este nuevo servicio. "Estamos ansiosos de traer a nuestros ciudadanos los beneficios de una competencia en el sistema de cable, lo que va a mejorar el servicio, más adelantos tecnológicas y precios más bajos", dijo el Alcalde Sullivan.

Un tema que causó alarma ante algunos de los presentes fue la participación de Jim Ross y John Judson como los negociadores principales de este contrato. Bill Collins, quien es miembro de la Comisión del Cable (la entidad que negoció el contrato actual con Comcast) expresó su disgusto resaltando que "la participación de estos individuos es un caso muy claro de conflicto de intereses". El señor Collins también dijo no haber estado enterado de este proceso ya que dicho comité tiene mucho tiempo que no se reúne. Jim Ross es el actual presidente de la organización que administra los canales de acceso público (canal 8 y 22) y el señor Judson es quien dirige el canal educativo de acceso local (canal 10).

A este comentario el Alcalde Sullivan respondió que la decisión tomada por él fue la mejor ya que le permitió a la ciudad contar con la experiencia de ellos sin costo alguno a la ciudad. El abogado de la ciudad explicó que por este proceso llevarse a cabo

de esta manera la ciudad se ahorró alrededor de 80,000 dólares.

Verizon no quiso hablar sobre este asunto ya que dicen no tener control del mismo. Pero aprovecharon la oportunidad para hablar sobre lo importante que es Lawrence para su crecimiento, pues ellos han ofrecido la suma de 350,000 dólares en dádivas a la ciudad como un incentivo para que se le otorgue la licencia. Estos fondos serán distribuidos en su totalidad en los primeros seis años de este contrato. Los fondos son dirigidos para los canales de acceso local y serán repartidos como se reparten los fondos que se reciben actualmente de Comcast: Dos tercios para el canal 10 y un tercio para los canales 8 y 22.

Otro dato importante sobre los canales de acceso local que salió a relucir fue que el sistema de Verizon será idéntico al de Comcast en cuanto a la distribución de fondos y los canales que se ven hoy día serán transmitidos también por Verizon.

Otro miembro de la Comisión del Cable que se quejó porque no se le tomó en cuenta durante las negociaciones fue John Lydon. Además, el señor Lydon habló sobre el sistema actual para que los ancianos reciban descuentos y le pidió a Verizon que una vez reciban la licencia implementaran una forma fácil de que las personas adultas puedan recibir un descuento. Este pedido final fue luego que Verizon se negara a poner en el contrato con la ciudad que le daría un descuento a los ancianos. Como razón Verizon citó la póliza nacional de la compañía.

De acuerdo a informaciones suministradas por Verizon, la empresa ha invertido millones de dólares transformando la tradicional red de teléfonos existente en esta ciudad de Lawrence en un avanzado sistema de fibra óptica que conecta directamente a las residencias y los negocios y provee video, acceso rápido al Internet y conexiones claras de voz.

El próximo paso es firmar el contrato luego de que este sea aceptado por la ciudad tomando en cuenta las preocupaciones generadas en esta reunión. Una vez aceptada la licencia, Verizon comenzará a ofrecer servicios en aproximadamente un año.

Una orientación gratuita para hipotecas patrocinada por la Ciudad de Lawrence y Lawrence Housing Partnership se llevará a cabo el domingo 3 de junio, de 2:00 p.m. a 4:00 p.m. en Northern Essex Community College, 78 Amesbury Street.

En un esfuerzo para combatir el aumento rápido de ejecuciones de hipoteca en la ciudad, por primera vez se está preparando este evento —orientación gratuita de hipoteca—reúne a más de 30 especialistas de hipoteca y expertos en préstamos para ayudar a propietarios locales a entender mejor sus hipotecas y para proporcionar consejos en cómo mantener sus hipotecas sanas y evitar trampas financieras comunes que pueden terminar en la ejecución de una hipoteca.

Ezra Haber Glenn, Director del Community Development Department de la Ciudad de Lawrence, enfatizó en la importancia de este enfoque preventivo. "A tratar con la crisis actual de la ejecución de una hipoteca, es absolutamente esencial que ayudemos a identificar los problemas antes que las familias caigan en esta posición. Para muchos propietarios—especialmente éstos con tasa de interés ajustable—esta orientación gratuita les ayudará a diagnosticar su situación".

Andrea Bopp-Stark, abogada de Neighborhood Legal Services en Lawrence ha estado trabajando con algunas de las

familias más afectadas. Ella acentuó la importancia de identificar los problemas de hipoteca temprano. "La gente de Lawrence ha sido golpeada duramente con préstamos hipotecarios turbios; pero la comunidad se ha reunido para enfrentar este asunto y proporcionar ayuda. Esta orientación es una oportunidad excelente para que las personas examinen su préstamo. Optimistamente, este será el primer paso a reconocer y combatir la necesidad inmensa de recursos financieros y legales para ayudar a personas que han sido víctimas de prestamistas ofreciendo esta clase de préstamos".

Todos los propietarios de Lawrence están invitados a venir a esta orientación. Propietarios que tienen las hipotecas con el interés alto o tasas ajustables o los que no están seguros que pueden cumplir con los pagos de sus hipotecas a largo plazo deben hacer un esfuerzo especial para asistir. Propietarios deben traer cualquier documento de la hipoteca para asegurar que obtengan el consejo más efectivo posible.

El evento es gratis y completamente bilingüe. Las personas, con prueba de propiedad también recibirán un reporte de crédito gratuito, proveído por Metro Credit Union y Sovereign Bank.

Esta es una actividad para educar al público. Los prestamistas no estarán vendiendo sus productos de préstamos, ni los servicios bancarios. Los participantes no harán trámites para refinanciar, ni para nuevos préstamos; deben esperar que este sea el primer paso a asegurar que tienen una hipoteca sana y fija.

La orientación se lleva a cabo inmediatamente después de la audiencia pública sobre ejecución de hipotecas en Lawrence, auspiciada por Sue Tucker y el

Nuevamente nuestro Alcalde en la Ciudad de Lawrence ha fallado en someter su presupuesto a tiempo para el año fiscal que comienza el 1ro de julio del 2007, a ser aprobado por el Concilio de esta ciudad. Esto no es nada nuevo con el gobierno de nuestra ciudad.

Yo soy de la opinión que esto se está haciendo intencionalmente para poner presión al Concilio y apruebe el presupuesto sin ser revisado o discutido, para así estar dentro del margen de la ley estatal. Esto mismo pasó con el presupuesto anterior sometido al Concilio, y el Alcalde tal vez piensa que esta estrategia le dará resultados otra vez.

Con el aumento de los impuestos de propiedades en un 100% en el año previo, y el más reciente aumento de un 113% en el agua y cloaca, nuestro gobierno ha puesto en peligro a una cantidad sustancial de dueños de casas, incluyendo a dueños ancianos de casas con un ingreso fijo. Ya que el alcalde sabía muy de antemano que nuestra ciudad no recibiría la ayuda estatal que normalmente recibía, yo pensaría que nuestro alcalde sería lo suficiente sensible para re-ajustar su presupuesto y tomar en cuenta esta deficiencia.

Sin embargo, nuestro alcalde sometió el presupuesto previo al Concilio sin ningún ajuste o recortes. Esta acción por parte de nuestro alcalde puso un peso innecesario sobre el contribuyente de nuestra ciudad.

Para este siguiente año fiscal nuestro gobierno tiene por objetivo tasar las

propiedades a un 100% de su valor en el mercado. Algunos opinan que nosotros los contribuyentes en la Ciudad de Lawrence, no estamos pagando nuestra parte correspondiente a los impuestos a la propiedad en comparación a nuestros vecinos en Andover, North Andover y Methuen.

Decir que un ciudadano en Lawrence que gana apenas \$15,000 anuales debería pagar la misma cantidad de impuestos que un ciudadano en Andover con un salario anual de \$150,000, o un ciudadano en Methuen con un ingreso anual de \$60,000, o un ciudadano en North Andover con un ingreso anual de \$80,000 es totalmente absurdo.

Yo, como un contribuyente de impuestos, y muchos otros en la ciudad estamos totalmente opuestos a cualquier aumento en los impuestos de propiedad. Nosotros también nos oponemos al más reciente aumento de un 113% en el agua y la cloaca. Nosotros estamos diciendo "¡Basta Ya!" de propiedades abandonadas. completamente diferente y yo disfrutaba cada momento de ese ahora entonces.

Mi familia acostumbraba empacar y moverse temporalmente a una villa pescadora llamada Baracoa, no muy lejos de La Habana, la capital de Cuba, tan pronto mi año escolar se terminaba. La separación corta era en términos geográficos solamente porque las dos ciudades eran tan diferentes como el día y la noche, e igualmente lo eran la población y el estilo de vida. Era una experiencia inolvidable que duraba el breve período de tres meses de verano y todos los años de una vida.

Nosotros no éramos ricos, así que compartíamos el alquiler de una casa grande con parientes con los que teníamos mucho en común, como divertirse. 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Discriminación está de vuelta en LHS

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Un grupo de padres y estudiantes tuvo éxito concertando una reunión con el Dr. Thomas Sharkey, Director del Campus y la Dra. Terika Smith, Principal de la Escuela Internacional de Lawrence High School el pasado miércoles, porque esa escuela está empleando un sistema para deshacerse de sus estudiantes el cual ellos consideran injusto. 1. Usted como Principal de la Escuela Internacional "Estudiantes Recién Llegados" no pueden obligar a los estudiantes a tomar un examen de GED ya que es ilegal y usted junto al Superintendente Escolar Wilfredo Laboy quieren obligar a nuestros estudiantes a tomar dicho examen sabiendo que va en contra de la ley, ya que para que un estudiante tome dicho examen tiene que estar fuera de la escuela. En días pasados usted les llamó "ignorantes" porque ellos no quisieron inscribirse para dicho examen.

2. Clases Regulares. A group of parents and students succeeded in having a meeting with Dr. Thomas Sharkey, Campus Director and Dr. Terika Smith, Principal of Lawrence High School last Wednesday, because the high school is now employing a system of attrition which they deem unfair. We are publishing their letter (in Spanish) on this page.

The school system has asked students in the International School who are 18 years old and over to sign up to take the GED (General Education Diploma or high school equivalency) test in Spanish since they have not mastered the English language. In order for an individual to take the GED exam, he or she must be out of school which is not the case here. These are good students with good marks, not problem students who simply have not been here long enough to have a good command of the language.

School officials tried to lure them with the idea of entering college sooner once they have their GED and Dr. Smith even called them "ignorant" for not wanting to accept that opportunity. It may sound good but these students want to learn English before they graduate from Lawrence High School so that they can enter college with that knowledge out of the way, instead of having to spend a couple of years doing it before they can dream of taking credit courses.

Lawrence has found a way to weed them out but this time it's going to fail because they are dealing with families that truly care about the future of their children. These students want to stay in school and make a better life for themselves and their families. Of course, in Lawrence Public Schools they do everything backwards.

A second meeting has been scheduled for Friday, June 1st, at 6:30 p.m. at the high school and they plan to bring up this issue at the next meeting of the School Committee on June 7 at 7:00 p.m.

The Politics of Neighborhood Women:

Where is the Village that Raises the Child?

On Saturday, June 9th, Woman's Agenda 2007 will hold its Ninth Annual Women & Policy Symposium at the Lawrence Senior Center, from 9:00 AM – 3:00 PM. This year the Symposium is dedicated to the Politics of Neighborhood Women. The inspiration for this theme stemmed from the recent trials and tribulations of Christian activist Michele and her teenage daughter Crystal (both names made up to protect their privacy). Michele and Crystal were more than mother and daughter. They were the best of friends until another mother decided that she would encourage Crystal's romantic rendezvous with her teenage son in one of the bedrooms in her home: a place where she would allow other young teenage children to engage in adult behaviors such as smoking, drugging, and drinking into odd hours of the night. Under this influence, Crystal became angry and rebelled against Michele's guidance. Michele tried several times to appeal to the other mother without success; and, then,

she turned to public and private agencies to guide Crystal out of this negative and life altering situation. All of the agencies protected Crystal's rights over Michele's parental rights. Today, 14-year old Crystal has dropped out of junior high school and is expecting a baby. Unfortunately Michele's story is becoming commonplace. Where is the outrage? Where is the support of the neighborhood woman who gives constantly to her community? Where are the neighbors who look after each others children? Where are the neighborhood politics that provide safe havens for families and children? Where is the village that raises the child?

For centuries neighborhood women are the crucial social capital that contributes to building safe and healthy communities; and, in the mid-1970s through to the late 1990s, thanks to organizations like the National Congress of Neighborhood Women in the United States and across the globe neighborhoods were recognized as the fundamental source for social policy, urban revitalization, and community organizing. While some men were active, neighborhood activism viewed as an extension of domestic responsibilities was a woman's domain. But in the most anxiously awaited new Millennium, there

is a startling decline in the importance of the neighborhood politics that tailored the political agenda for municipalities, states, nations and the world. Blanchette delays city budget (not the Mayor this time)

Lawrence Mayor Michael J. Sullivan notified the members of the City Council that was not able to have the city budget ready by the noon deadline on Thursday but said that he will be submitting it the next day for sure. Council President Patrick Blanchette, presuming that he likes to go by the book, said that he would not accept it if it was not there on time. Bravo, Blanchette, teach him a lesson!

Social Services Partnership Solicits Community Input on Issues

A coalition of social service agencies welcomed the community in developing services for a new community program. "Community Cares" was one of the first community-based events to be held in a newly created, neighborhood-focused office based on the English "PATCH" model.

The PATCH model represents a shift in organizational dynamics in social service provision. Rather than agencies determining the needs of the community, the PATCH model expects grass-roots involvement by the residents of the neighborhood that the office serves.

The Open Space Forum was a way to empower local residents to express what they see as the issues and needs facing children and families in their neighborhoods, and how to address these needs. There were 60+ adults and youth who participated in this event.

The goal is to have community members be equal partners with social service agencies and have a strong voice, and stake in, deciding how best to serve their neighborhoods. Several community based strategies will evolve from the project that will take direction from community residents, Neighborhood Committee, Parent Council, and a Youth Council.

This program is a partnership between the Lawrence/Methuen Community Coalition, Community Day Care, TAM Presbyterian Church, the Department of Social Services and the Greater Lawrence Community Action Council which serves as the fiscal lead agency for the PATCH Project.

ABOUT THE NEW OFFICE

The new office is sited at the TAM Presbyterian Church, 96 East Haverhill Street in the Prospect Hill area of Lawrence. It is the third such office that has been developed in the state of Massachusetts.

The PATCH concept is to create community ownership, hope, self-determination and pride where children and families are safe and have meaningful futures through collaboration and mutual responsibility. The office will achieve this goal through promoting empowerment and involvement of community members who seek support.

SBA approved the first loan for 2007 flooding

We have approved our first loan for the April, 2007 floods here in Massachusetts. The loan was an individual home application, approved for an applicant in Salisbury.

For the 2006 floods the average home loan was for \$26,287 at 2.937%, the average business loan was for \$105,529 at 4%. Total loans approved for the Commonwealth for the May 2006 floods was 1,240 total loans for \$43,610,700. Our challenge this year is getting people to apply for the available assistance.

Our Disaster Loan Outreach Center at 49 Low Street in Newburyport will be there as long as there is enough activity to justify keeping it open. The hours for the center are 9AM to 6PM Monday thru Friday, until further notice. Thank you very much for your help getting the message to the victims of this disaster.



When we said we were going to the show, we never called it the movies or the theater.

Did you ever own a slingshot? Did you make your own from a V shaped branch? Did you ever set bottles up on a fence and tried to break them with a missile from your slingshot? Ever hit your target? How bout a pea shooter? Almost every boy I knew owned one. A Red Ryder BB gun was also owned by many kids. All these weapons could be used as you went on a hike in the woods towards where Route 93 is today.

These hikes were like a safari and although we thought we were the great white hunters we would very seldom meet any prey. Occasionally, a squirrel or a chipmunk would have us chasing it down to no avail. A skunk sometimes appeared as if to let us know we shouldn't be bothering his space and we quickly got the message.

How about neighborhood games did you play kick the can? Buck, buck, how many fingers do I have up? Did you crush your heels into empty cans and wear them around as the rims wrapped around your heels?

Did you own a high bouncer? It was a small pink ball that it seemed was meant

for playing outs on the steps of a porch. To play outs you needed an opponent who as you would do would pick a name of a team and you would have a series. Like one team would be the Red Sox and the other probably the Boston Braves (I bet you thought it would be the Yankees but to the Boston teams were always vying for the popularity of the area). Each kid knew the lineups and would send the imaginary Ted Williams, Bobby Doerrs and Johnny Peskys to the plate and the kid who had the Braves sent Bob Elliot, Earl Torgeson, Sibby Sisti and Sam Jethroe to the bat. (Sam by the way was the first black player to play in Boston.)

When the high bouncer went over the defenders head it was usually a home run, I say usually because in some porch areas we had designated lines for homers, doubles and triples, grounders when fielded cleanly were outs and you were allowed three per inning, the game was a nine inning affair. Many kids developed sore arms playing this popular game and maybe some strengthened their arms.

Tag football was played on most streets; didn't you play on your street?

Basketball wasn't too popular in

those days but some streets had baskets nailed on electric poles (a thing I found to be dangerous, and a hindrance later when I became a lineman for the electric companies). We didn't have bucket trucks when I was young and we climbed the poles physically in those days and if one came down or fell on a makeshift hoop it was no laughing matter.

The YMCA and the Boys Club (both still in operation today) had many people playing roundball in those days. Roger Twoomey the city's former License Commissioner, his brother Neil, Steve Perocchi, Carmen Martellini now a retired military man living in Seabrook these days after watching his grandchildren Charlotte and Sarah Muller weave their magic for Jim Tilsey's Andover team, Joe Hackney, and Billy Nagle and Joe Cirus were players at these venues, most were multiple sports stars.

These were the days when you got your windshield cleaned every time and your oil checked, gas pumped all for free and with out asking, some places offered a free fill up if the attendant didn't offer these services. No, this isn't science fiction or the twilight zone, this was how it was. How

about this at most places you got trading stamps to boot, this is a guess but I bet gas was about 55 cents a gallon. No, I'm not crazy. Laundry detergent had a free glass or a towel hidden inside the box or maybe a free dish.

It was a time when your Mom wore nylons that came in two pieces and a time when if they threatened to keep you back a grade if you failed, they did. I know many who were kept back at least once and still went on to a successful and well balanced life.




Baracoa: the summer and sun that never set

Summers are periods of doing nothing and reaching for everything. The sun is up longer, recently awakened by the melting spring and happy to be out of the long winter sleepless nights that kept it under cold wraps and envious of the shining silvery moon. Birds wake up you early in the morning with their lively chirps and you wonder if they are the youngest members of a crew that has not learned how to sail yet until you hear them no more and realize that they finally left the nest; speaking of empty nesters!

You know it is summer when the student crowds disappear from our campus because they have gone where the other sides of their constant cell phones conversations were. And you wonder how much quiet there is where there was so much learning going on before, and one wonders if it will ever return. The sound of the flip-flops is gone.

As I watched my laughing twin granddaughters chasing a white butterfly that was obviously enjoying the newly found flying ability resulting from the miraculous metamorphosis of a caterpillar, my mind went back in time. Summers are periods of happy memories for me. Times when my life was less complicated and my goals less lofty. It was not a nine-to-five world; it was actually a "this minute to the next" world. Being here now had a totally different meaning then and I enjoyed every moment of that now back then.

My family used to pack up and move part time to a fishing town by the name of Baracoa, not far from Havana, the capital of Cuba, as soon as my school year was over. That short separation was in geographic distance only because the two cities were as different as night and day, and so was the population and life style. It was an unforgettable experience that would last the brief three months of one summer and all the years of one life.

We were not wealthy by any means, so we shared living rented spaces with close relatives with whom we had a lot in common, like how to have fun. All I remember is that once I removed my city shoes to spread my anxious wings in the ocean smelling resort, my feet would not see them for three months and it would be hard to wear them again on the return to civility. The shoes were the same, but the feet had grown and swollen to a point where they could not coexist; not without much cajoling.

Life in Baracoa was simple, the days tranquil but active, riding bikes most of the

day and night, swimming several times, eating and playing games in between. The coast was rocky and the only place where we could swim with a level of security was in the "pozetas," deep areas under water that had been flattened with dynamite to make them rock-free and swimmer-friendly. Don't ask me to translate the word "pozeta" (ditch?) because I have never seen it written in Spanish. I guess it was like a secret password for us. They were holes away from the shore and we had to walk over long wood bridge spans before we could jump into the deep waters waiting at the end. To this day, my frequent laps in my college's semi-Olympic swimming pool are the after effects of so much free swimming.

I think of our childhood lives in Baracoa and feel some sort of association with Mark Twain's Tom Sawyer and his famous exploits. Fishing was an adventure that started from the moment we hunted for the bait. I remember our crawling under houses looking for macaws for fish bait. Macaws, which live in shells they carry on their shoulders protected from predators by locking its doors with their large claws, have to shed those shells as their bodies grow and need bigger living quarters.

They do not want to be caught naked when they change their habitat, because that is their weakest moment of exposure in a cruel world of natural selection where big fish eats little fish. You would not want to be caught naked either when you move from one house to the other because you outgrew it, would you? The neighbors would not approve: "Hey, look at Paul, there he goes again; no clothes, probably changing homes." That does not sound proper. Once the macaw meat was obtained after much avoidance of the threatening defensive claw that could cut our fingers, the next step was sticking it in the fishhook for lure and sit with patience for some fish to swallow the hook; bad idea for the fish as we know.

Our fish of choice was the "mojarra" for obvious reasons that will become apparent: They are small, silvery fish, having extremely protrusive mouths, which make them ideal for biting on the hooks. Catching a "mojarra" was the high point of the fishing day. Never mind that we had to deal with other troublesome sea creatures like the electric eels, snaky creatures that did not satisfy themselves with hooks but could catch your toes unexpectedly while you swam. Some were poisonous.

For several days in the middle of summer we would on occasion receive the welcome visit of a wandering circus. They were not large by any means; not Ringling Brothers stuff, but full of clowns and gymnasts that would make "Cirque du Soleil" yawn with boredom. One of my cousins, adventurous young fellow him, would make friends with a "tarugo" (roust-about) and find a way to help in exchange for a free admission ticket. We were also most amused by the various

games offered to the public for a fee. There was one roulette game in particular that we eventually imitated and used after the circus had left town.

The attendant would work with a roulette surrounded by numbered boxes with a front door, each circling a larger box lying in the center of the ring that was tied to a rope above. Inside the box the attendant's assistant, usually a bored young woman who probably wanted to be somewhere else, would place a rabbit and would ask for bets from the curious public. Folks would place money on any of the numbered boxes and wait for the rabbit to be released. The animal would run around for a while sniffing here and there and would attempt to leave the circle through the door of one of the boxes making the number of that box the winner of the roulette game and the recipient of some silly prize.

We learned and imitated the system fast and created a local version of our own that we played for our young friends for a while after the circus had left town. For boxes we used borrowed bricks and lacking a rabbit that would suit the purpose we opted for a large crab instead and asked for bets from the other youngsters. The picture of the crab running around looking for a box exit was funny if not profitable.

One day the crab, who obviously had no interest in the game, got away and disappeared under a house. We had a great time though. Once I visited Las Vegas and the image of our childhood roulette came to my mind when I saw the croupier releasing the wheel. I wondered if I could have written my "crabby" experience in an application for employment to a casino. I dropped the idea.

One of the last times I spent my summers in Baracoa we were side swiped by a fast moving hurricane. I had never spent such a stormy day in the beach and was quite shocked by the force of the approaching winds and the ferocity of the waves against the shoreline. Riding on my bike was quite a challenge. I remember sitting on it, my feet on the handlebar and letting the wind push me from the back. There was no need to pedal, honest.

Unfortunately wherever I went driven by the wind I had to return as well, and pedaling against its forces was not easy, in fact so hard that the wind pushed me down a ditch in an embankment where I hit and

our imagination? Were we better off before we knew what hula hoops or Rubik's cubes were? Were we happier when it was just the sixty four dollar question instead of the sixty four thousand dollar question or now that it is "So You Want to be a Millionaire"?

How many of us can name the bands of today and also enjoy the way they all look and sound alike. I'll take Harry James, Guy Lombardo, Les Brown and his Band of renown any day and how about Glenn Miller and Woody Herman and finally the off the wall sounds of Spike Jones?

Well, we've covered a broad expanse of time and I guess me and people that grew up in my time that agree with these viewpoints have earned the right to be called "old geezers".

scratched my right leg having to return home with a bloody knee, a bruised ego and the wheel-twisted bike over my shoulders. To this day I carry the scar of that stormiest of days. But no, next time you see me don't ask me to show you my scar. Folks don't like to do that.

It was in Baracoa where my penchant for writing fiction first showed its creative head. I used to sit down after lunch with six or seven of my buddies and cousins to tell them the stories of books I had read or movies I had seen, a memory they still relish to this day as I am told. What they did not know at the time, and I would feel bad if I told them today, was that all those stories were the product of a fertile imagination, mine.

Creating a new drama every day was no minor challenge at that age, so feel no sympathy for me now when I write my points of view. That is one of the many memories I still carry and will carry on all my life, because Baracoa was the happy summer and sun that never set and never will; a memory that flows from my pen in more ways than one every time I write. Can you smell the mojarras? I certainly can.

And that is my point of view this beginning of a warm summer day. Enjoy yours.

Lawrence Mayor fails to deliver budget on time - again

Once again our City Mayor in Lawrence has failed to submit his budget on a timely basis for the fiscal year beginning on July 2007 for the approval of the City Council. Obviously, this is nothing new with our city government.

My guess is that this is being done intentionally to put pressure on our City Council to approve the budget without much review or discussion, in order to meet the State's dead-line. The same thing happened with the last budget submitted to the Council, and the mayor is hoping that this strategy will work again.

With the increase of property taxes by 100% in the previous budget and the most recent increase of 113% in the Water and Sewer Rate, our city government has placed in jeopardy a substantial number of home owners, including elderly home owners with a fixed income. Since the mayor knew way ahead of time that our city would not receive the state aide that it normally receives, you would think that our mayor would be sensible enough to re-adjust his

budget to account for this deficiency.

Instead, our mayor submitted the previous budget to the City Council without any cuts. This action on the part of our mayor put an unnecessary burden on the city's taxpayers.

For this coming fiscal year, our city government is intending to levy the property owner in the City of Lawrence at 100% of the property's market value. Some are contending that we, the taxpayers in the City of Lawrence, are not paying our fair share of property taxes in comparison to our neighboring Towns of Andover, Methuen and North Andover.

To say that a citizen in Lawrence who earns \$15,000 a year should pay the same amount of property taxes as a citizen in Andover with a yearly salary income of \$150,000, or a citizen in Methuen with a yearly salary of \$60,000, or a citizen in North Andover, with a yearly salary of \$80,000 is totally absurd.

I, as a taxpayer, and many others in our city are totally opposed to any additional property tax increase. We also oppose the most recent increase of 113% in our Water and Sewer Rate. We are saying enough is enough. We are asking the Mayor and the City Council to roll-back the Water

and Sewer increase and to adjust the rate to a level that will be more suitable to our tax-payer, thus lessening the burden and negative impact on the home owner and their tenants.

It is for this reason that we, a group of homeowners, are calling for a protest against the increase in the Water and Sewer Rate and any additional increase of property taxes for the fiscal year beginning July 1st, 2007. The protest is scheduled for Tuesday, June 5, 2007, at 6:00 p.m., in front of the Lawrence City Hall, 200 Common Street.

If you feel as a homeowner, as a taxpayer, that our city government is not being sensitive to your financial and economic condition; if you feel that our city government is not taking your needs into account. If you feel that our city government has placed on you a burden that you cannot bare, then come to this protest and let the mayor and our City Council hear your voice.

Come and let our city government and City Council that "Enough is enough".

the corner of Park and Hampshire Street. The city had a concentration of "white trash" in the Bromfield and Alma Street area, where the city police was constantly present to resolve disputes between these residents. There was a substantial amount of substandard and dilapidated housing, and hundreds of abandoned properties. Real estate value was so low that you could purchase a six family building on Park Street for \$1,000 and a two and three family building together on Bromfield Street for \$6,000. Park Street in the Arlington neighborhood was considered the ghetto of the city and a dilapidated city jail that fed the city with a substantial amount of criminal elements. This was the condition of our city during 1965.

And so I ask: What is Mrs. Hughes referring to when she says that we, the Latinos destroyed the "cultural aspect and design of our city"? Well, let's see. Since the arrival of Latinos in this City, between the years 1967, the 70s and 80s, the motorcycle gangs disappeared, the multiple drunk bars that plagued the city are no longer here, the police has no longer to contend with the "white trash" in the Bromfield and Alma Street area, there are no abandoned properties in the city, most properties have been either vinyl sided, renovated, or painted and look better than ever before. Property value hit the roof from a \$1000 six-unit building to a three-family building for \$400,000, new construction of housing in many of our abandoned city lots is evident, there are several cultural yearly events in the city that attract thousands of visitors from other parts of the state and New England, most school buildings in the city have been replaced for new and more modern ones. Is this what Mrs. Hughes is referring to? If not, she should come and visit our city more often to view the wonderful changes that have been made since the Latino Community arrived in the City of Lawrence.

Federal Aid Programs for Massachusetts Disaster Recovery

Following is a summary of key federal disaster aid programs that can be made available as needed and warranted under President Bush's major disaster declaration for Massachusetts.

ASSISTANCE FOR THE COMMONWEALTH AND AFFECTED LOCAL GOVERNMENTS CAN INCLUDE AS REQUIRED:

- Payment of not less than 75 percent of the eligible costs for repairing or replacing damaged public facilities, such as roads, bridges, utilities, buildings, schools, recreational areas and similar publicly owned property, as well as certain private non-profit organizations engaged in community service activities. (Source: FEMA funded, state administered.)
- Payment of not less than 75 percent of the eligible costs for removing debris from public areas and for emergency measures taken to save lives and protect property and public health. (Source: FEMA funded, state administered.)
- Payment of not more than 75 percent of the approved costs for hazard mitigation projects undertaken by state and local governments to prevent or reduce long-term risk to life and property from natural or technological disasters. (Source: FEMA funded, state administered.)

HOW TO APPLY FOR ASSISTANCE:

- Application procedures for local governments will be explained at a series of federal/state applicant briefings with locations to be announced in the affected area by recovery officials. Approved public repair projects are paid through the state from funding provided by FEMA and other participating federal agencies.

FEMA coordinates the federal government's role in preparing for, preventing, mitigating the effects of, responding to, and recovering from all domestic disasters, whether natural or man-made, including acts of terror.

Mayor; Amory Should Go To Firefighters' Credit Union

Mayor James J. Fiorentini today said that it was his recommendation that the armory building on Kenoza Avenue go to the Firefighters' Credit Union. The Mayor said the he recommended rejecting the competing bid from developers to put in a strip mall.

The Mayor said there were a number of reasons for his recommendation among them being that the firefighters had done a great deal of volunteer work on the building, the building is not zoned for commercial use and could not be used for a strip mall.

The Mayor said he would ask the council to authorize him to execute a purchase and sales agreement with the credit union. Further negotiations and concern for the preservation of the building were of the Mayor's two main concerns. Further negotiations will be necessary to pursue the best interests of the City of Haverhill.

"It is my recommendation to the city council that this building be preserved. The best way to preserve is to sell it to the Fire Department Credit Union."

The Mayor continued to say; "After conferring with our economic development and planning director, I do not believe that it would be in the city's best interest to rezone this area for a commercial strip mall. I recommend selling the building only with conditions that would allow for preservation for public use."

The final decision on the distribution of any land lies with the City Council.

Por breves días en medio del verano había ocasiones en que recibíamos la bienvenida visita de un circo errante. No era muy grande; nada parecido al Ringling Brothers, pero poseía payasos y gimnastas que hubieran hecho al "Cirque du Soleil" bostezar de aburrimiento. Uno de mis primos, venturoso muchacho él, se hacía amigo de los "tarugos" del circo para que le dieran un boleto de admisión gratis. Nos divertían los diversos juegos con los que se distraía al público a cambio de unas monedas. Había un juego de ruleta en particular que eventualmente imitamos y usamos después que el circo se alejó del pueblo.

Uno de los asistentes manejaba la ruleta que consistía de cajas numeradas que tenían una puerta al frente y que rodeaban a otra caja más larga en el centro del círculo y que se hallaba atada a una cuerda colgando desde arriba. Dentro de la caja la asistente, usualmente una aburrida joven que probablemente deseaba estar en otro lugar, colocaba un conejo y pedía al curioso público que hicieran apuestas.

Los apostadores colocaban dinero en las cajas numeradas que escogían y esperaban hasta que el conejo se liberara de su escondite. El animal corría de un lado a otro de la ruleta, oliendo aquí y allá, y trataba de escapar el círculo de cajas a través de una de sus puertas haciendo que el número sobre la caja escogida como escape fuera el ganador de una bagatela de premio.

Nosotros imitamos el sistema y creamos una versión que jugábamos entre amigos por cierto tiempo después que el circo se había ido. En lugar de cajas usábamos casillas de ladrillos de construcción y como no teníamos conejos que se prestaran para la ocasión, capturamos un largo cangrejo y pedímos apuestas de nuestro público juvenil. La imagen de un cangrejo corriendo alrededor del círculo de ladrillos buscando por una salida era risible si no lucrativa.

En uno de los juegos el cangrejo, que no tenía mucho interés en el juego, se nos escapó y se escondió debajo de una casa. Pero no hay dudas que tuvimos un tiempo divertido. Montar en bicicleta era un desafío. Recuerdo sentarme en mi bicicleta, los pies sobre el manubrio y dejando que el viento me empujara por la espalda. No había necesidad de pedalear; se los juro.

Desafortunadamente de doquiera que fuera empujado por el viento tenía que regresar pedaleando en su contra, y eso no era fácil. En realidad era tan difícil que el viento me empujó hacia una zanja en la cuneta donde golpeé y corté mi pierna derecha, teniendo que regresar a mi casa con una rodilla sangrienta, un ego herido y una bicicleta con ruedas torcidas cargada sobre mis hombros. Hasta hoy tengo la cicatriz de ese día tormentoso en mi pierna. Pero no, cuando usted me vea la próxima vez no tiene que pedirme que se la enseñe. La gente no hace esas cosas.

Fue en Baracoa donde mi interés por escribir ficción enseñó su cabeza creadora por vez primera. Acostumbraba sentarme con seis o siete amigos y primos después del almuerzo para contarles historias de libros yo había leído o películas que había visto, una memoria que todavía ellos disfrutan hasta hoy día de acuerdo con lo que me dicen.

Lo que nunca les dije en aquella ocasión, y me sentiría muy mal si se los dijera ahora, era que esas historias eran producto de una imaginación fértil, la mía.

Crear un nuevo drama cada día era una tarea nada fácil a mi edad, así que no se comiseren por mí ahora cuando escribo mis puntos de vista. Esa es una de las muchas memorias que todavía tengo y tendré toda mi vida, porque Baracoa fue el verano y el sol que jamás se ponían o se pondrán. Es un recuerdo que fluye de mi pluma de muchas maneras cada vez que escribo. ¿No pueden oler las mojarras? Yo ciertamente las huelo.

Y ese es mi punto de vista este día de comienzo de verano. Disfrute el suyo.

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
