

Alabó su Programa Integral de Medicina en su lucha en contra de la obesidad infantil.

El 30 de junio de 2008, el Cirujano General (Temporero), Almirante Steven K. Galson, MD, MPH, visitó el Greater Lawrence Family Health Center en Lawrence, MA, como parte de su gira nacional para promover el Departamento de Salud y Servicios Humanos de los Estados Unidos y su iniciativa de prevención del sobrepeso y la obesidad infantil.

El Cirujano General presentó el premio "Healthy Youth for a Healthy Future" (Juventud Saludable por un Futuro Saludable) al GLFHC en reconocimiento de su programa Pediátrico de Prevención de la Obesidad (POEMA, en sus siglas en inglés), que ofrece métodos creativos para combatir la obesidad infantil. El programa del Centro de Salud está financiado por la Fundación New Balance. Esta asociación se basa en un interés mutuo para hacer frente a los riesgos asociados con el sobrepeso en niños y en la promoción de opciones saludables que conducen a una vida sana.

"Me siento honrado de tener la oportunidad de visitar las comunidades de todo el país, y de reunirme con las personas que están trabajando activamente en la búsqueda de medios a nivel comunitario para prevenir el sobrepeso y obesidad entre los niños", dijo el Dr Galson. En Lawrence, el Doctor Galson se reunió con los principales líderes de la comunidad incluyendo los representantes del gobierno estatal y local y las instituciones académicas para debatir cuestiones de prevención de la obesidad infantil y aprender sobre los programas de prevención existentes.

Dr. Jeffrey Geller, director del programa de Medicina Integral en GLFHC, aceptó con

¿Sabía Usted?

- Que hasta la fecha, más de 12.5 millones de niños, niñas y adolescentes - el 17.1% de las personas entre las edades de 2 a 19 años - están pasados de peso.
- Adolescentes con sobrepeso tienen un 70 por ciento más de probabilidades de convertirse en adultos con sobrepeso o en adultos obesos.
- El número de niños con sobrepeso se ha triplicado más de tres veces en los últimos tres decenios.
- Los estudios demuestran que casi el 34 por ciento de los niños y adolescentes en los Estados Unidos tienen o bien exceso de peso o están en riesgo de convertirse en sobrepeso.
- Las investigaciones han demostrado que los padres son a menudo el modelo más importante a imitar de sus hijos. Si ellos ven que sus padres disfrutan de alimentos saludables y hacen ejercicio, es más probable que los niños hagan lo mismo.

Felicitando a Manzi y Fiorentini

Los alcaldes de dos ciudades vecinas están siendo alabados por sus acciones decisivas para conservar gasolina y como siempre, Lawrence carece de liderazgo para tomar medidas similares.

El Alcalde William Manzi de Methuen dijo claramente que, "los empleados a quienes le han asignado un vehículo que se pueda llevar a casa por las noches se lo puede llevar al final del día solamente si vive dentro de 10 millas del límite de la ciudad." También dijo estar dispuesto a aceptar sugerencias de los miembros del concilio y del público en general e inclusive está considerando el uso de autos electrónicos para los empleados municipales que necesitan moverse dentro de la ciudad.

El Alcalde Manzi también les aconsejó otras medidas para ahorrar la gasolina, tales como dejar el motor andando cuando están parados. El alcalde también revisará el uso de gasolina y el millaje mensualmente.

En Haverhill, el Alcalde James Fiorentini ha ido un paso más allá quitándole el uso de autos a muchos empleados a menos que puedan justificar por qué lo necesitan como un requisito de su empleo.

El ahorro que estas medidas traerán va más allá del precio de la gasolina. Estos autos están siendo mantenidos por las ciudades además del costo del seguro.

En Lawrence, activistas comunitarios así como oficiales electos han mostrado interés en reducir el número de autos que se llevan a casa sin tener éxito. El problema es que los empleados municipales se han acostumbrado a obtener un carro a la par del salario. Si ellos deben tener un auto para efectuar sus labores diarias, este no debe ser utilizado para llevarlo a casa al final del día, ir de compras al mercado, recoger a los hijos en la escuela y usarlo como el auto de la familia. No está escrito en ninguna parte que deben recibir un auto, ni siquiera el Alcalde Michael Sullivan.

Felicitamos al Alcalde Manzi y al Alcalde Fiorentini por tener el valor de tomar las decisiones correctas.

Praising Manzi and Fiorentini

The mayors of two neighboring cities are being praised for their decisive action to conserve gasoline and as usual, Lawrence lacks the leadership to take the same measures.

Mayor William Manzi of Methuen made it very clear that, "employees who are assigned take home vehicles may park their vehicles at home at the end of the workday only if they reside within 10 miles of the city limits." He also said that he is open to further suggestions from the City Council and the public and is even considering electric cars for city employees who need to move around.

Mayor Manzi also advised city employees of other measures that will reduce gasoline consumption, such as to minimize travel and not to leave their vehicles idling. The mayor will also review gasoline usage and mileage monthly.

In Haverhill, Mayor James Fiorentini has gone a step further by taking away the use of city cars from many employees unless they can justify keeping it as a requirement of their jobs.

The savings these measures will bring go beyond the price of gas. These are automobiles being serviced by the cities for their wear and tear, along with the insurance costs.

In Lawrence, community activists as well as elected officials have shown an interest in reducing the number of take-home cars with no success. The problem is that municipal employees have grown accustomed to getting a car along with their paychecks. If they must have a car for their daily chores, there is no reason why they should take them home, go grocery shopping, pick up their children from school and use it as the family car. It is not written anywhere that they should get it, not even Mayor Michael Sullivan.

Congratulations to Mayor Manzi and Mayor Fiorentini for having the courage to make the right decisions.

Lantigua presenta proyectos de ley para fortalecer leyes sobre armas de fuego

El Representante Estatal William Lantigua (D-Lawrence) ha presentado dos proyectos de ley para fortalecer las leyes relativas a la posesión de armas en la comunidad. La primera consistiría en aumentar las sanciones por falta de informe, la pérdida, robo, o la recuperación de un arma de fuego, y por posesión ilegal de un arma de fuego. La otra impondría cárcel obligatoria por no haber entregado su arma de fuego después de la expiración de una tarjeta de identificación o licencia, y requeriría una prueba fotográfica del número de serie de un arma para la renovación de cualquier licencia de armas.

Lantigua dijo que cree que la rigidez de las sanciones servirá como un medio eficaz de disuasión y ayuda a hacer las comunidades más seguras.

"Tenemos que enviar el mensaje de que mantener el registro de un arma de fuego es la principal responsabilidad del propietario", dijo Lantigua. "Cuando se desconoce el paradero de las armas mortíferas, las tragedias ocurren."

Por la negligencia de informar la pérdida, robo, o la recuperación de un arma de fuego, la ley de Massachusetts establece una multa de no menos de \$200 ni más de \$1000 por una primera ofensa, y no menos de \$1000 ni más de \$5000 por una segunda ofensa. La legislación de Lantigua establecería una multa de \$1000 y un año de libertad condicional por una primera ofensa, y una multa de \$5000 y dos años de libertad condicional por una segunda ofensa. Si no se informa la pérdida, robo, o la recuperación de un arma de fuego a la junta de sistemas de antecedentes penales del estado, así como a la autoridad local que

otorga la licencia, también puede recibir una suspensión o revocación de la tarjeta de identificación de armas de fuego, su licencia para portar armas de fuego, o ambos. (La tarjeta de identificación de un arma de fuego, emitido por la junta del sistema de antecedentes penales, es necesario para la posesión de una escopeta, rifle, o armas de fuego de gran capacidad, mientras que una licencia de armas de fuego, expedido por un departamento de policía local, es lo único que se requiere para portar pistolas de mano.)

El proyecto de ley también aumenta penas de cárcel por posesión ilegal de armas de fuego. Por posesión ilícita de una escopeta, rifle, o arma de gran capacidad,

cargadas o descargadas, el proyecto de ley impondría una pena mínima de dos años, un aumento de los dieciocho meses actuales a dos y medio años. Por posesión ilícita de una pistola, la pena mínima subirá a cinco años, de dos y medio a cinco años.

Del mismo modo, un segundo proyecto de ley aumentaría las multas e introduciría sentencias de cárcel obligatorias por posesión de armas de fuego después de la expiración de un arma de fuego tarjeta de identificación o licencia. Actualmente, el no entregar una escopeta, rifle, o armas de fuego de gran capacidad después de la expiración del vencimiento de una tarjeta de identificación de un arma de fuego, o el no entregar su arma de fuego después de la expiración de una licencia, se castigan con una multa civil de \$500 a \$5000.

El proyecto de ley de Lantigua haría que estos delitos penales, sancionables con multas de no menos de \$5000 ó más de \$10,000 dólares y prisión de seis meses a un año. También requeriría que las personas que solicitan la renovación de tarjetas de identificación o licencias para armas de fuego tengan que mostrar pruebas fotográficas de los números de serie de las armas que poseen.

Nueva Ley de Asientos de Seguridad para Niños

El Departamento de Salud Pública (DPH) anima a los padres a asegurarse de que los niños pasajeros menores de ocho años estén sentados en asientos elevados de seguridad ("booster seat", en inglés) al andar en un automóvil. La nueva ley, firmada por el gobernador Deval Patrick, entra en efecto el 10 de julio de 2008. Esta ley requiere que los niños pasajeros anden en asientos elevados hasta los 8 años de edad o hasta que midan 4 pies 9 pulgadas de altura, lo equivalente a 1,45m.

La ley anterior solamente requería el asiento elevado para los niños menores de 5 años que pesaban menos de 40 libras (18 Kg.). Ambas leyes requieren el uso del cinturón de seguridad para los niños pasajeros entre los 8 y 12 años.

"Esta nueva ley envía un mensaje importante a padres y a personas que cuidan niños, que el cinturón de seguridad no es para niños, sino que los asientos de seguridad lo son", dijo el comisionado de salud pública, John Auerbach. "La mayoría de las lesiones se puede prevenir con el uso correcto de un asiento elevado para niños".

Los accidentes de tránsito son la causa principal de muerte en niños entre los 4 y 8 años de edad. Los asientos elevados de seguridad pueden reducir la tasa de lesiones un 58 por ciento comparado al uso del cinturón de seguridad. Un asiento elevado permite que el cinturón de seguridad se posicione sobre las partes más fuertes del cuerpo del niño – su cintura y hombro – en vez del abdomen y el cuello. El asiento trasero es el lugar más seguro para los niños pasajeros.

Los asientos elevados de seguridad cuestan entre 15 y 150 dólares y deben fijarse al asiento trasero del vehículo con cinturones de seguridad que sujetan desde el hombro hasta la cintura. Los dos tipos de asientos más usados son los que tienen el respaldo elevado ("high back", en inglés) o los del tipo sin respaldo ("backless", en inglés). Para que estén bien posicionados, ambos tipos de asiento deben usarse con cinturones de seguridad que sujetan desde el hombro hasta la cintura.

A partir del 10 de julio de 2008, los niños de hasta 8 años de edad o los que midan menos de 4 pies 9 pulgadas (1,45 m) deberán andar en automóviles con el equipo de seguridad apropiado. Después de que el niño ya esté demasiado grande para su sillita del automóvil, ellos deberán andar en un asiento elevado de seguridad ("booster seat", en inglés) y tener puesto un cinturón de seguridad de falda y hombro.

Utilice la esta tabla para saber qué tipo de asiento de seguridad debería usar su niño.

Recuerde!

- Con cualquier tipo de asiento de seguridad, el lugar más seguro para su niño es en el asiento trasero.
- Usted es el mejor ejemplo para su niño. Por lo tanto, siempre póngase el cinturón de seguridad – y asegúrese de que todos en el automóvil tienen el cinturón puesto, en los asientos de adelante y los de atrás también. ¡Es la ley para todos!

Lawrence logra nuevos fondos para transportación

El Representante Estatal William Lantigua (D-Lawrence) anunció que la propuesta legislativa para bonos de transporte aprobada recientemente por la Cámara de Representantes incluye cuatro de sus asignaciones de fondos para proyectos en Lawrence.

Esas asignaciones de fondos reservados suman casi 3.5 millones de dólares e incluyen:

- 1.5 millones de dólares para un puente peatonal sobre la Ruta 114 cerca del nuevo High School de Lawrence, donde un estudiante fue atropellado por un carro el año pasado;
- 1 millón de dólares para el proyecto Union Crossing, una iniciativa de Lawrence CommunityWorks que va a transformar una red de fábricas textiles en un nuevo centro residencial y comercial;
- 750,000 dólares para la reparación y restauración del Puente South Canal; y
- 225,000 dólares para reparaciones a la calle Hampshire.

Lantigua dijo que cree que una nueva pasarela aumentará la seguridad pública en la calle Winthrop cerca de la escuela superior de Lawrence. En octubre, Darío Rodríguez, de 11 años de edad, fue atropellado por un carro cuando trataba de cruzar la carretera que separa la escuela y Sullivan Park en el lado norte desde las tiendas y restaurantes de comida rápida que tiene la parte sur. Sufrió masivas lesiones en la cabeza y murió la mañana siguiente.

"Esta pasarela no sólo protegerá a los estudiantes, sino a todos los peatones y conductores," dijo Lantigua. "Lo único que lamento es que no se pudo construir antes de que un joven perdiera la vida," señaló Lantigua.

Dijo además que se sentía contento por

la inclusión de fondos para la reparación del puente South Canal y de la calle Hampshire, y para el proyecto de desarrollo económico y reurbanización Union Crossing.

"La salud económica de cualquier comunidad depende en el mantenimiento de su infraestructura. Es la clave para la continuación del desarrollo," dijo Lantigua. "Esto es especialmente cierto en una ciudad histórica como Lawrence, con su sistema de canales y puentes. Estas mejoras aumentan la posibilidad del éxito de Union Crossing y de otros proyectos de reurbanización," añadió.

Otros miembros de la delegación de Lawrence expresaron su satisfacción por la cantidad de fondos asignados a la ciudad en la propuesta legislativa de bonos para transporte. Ahora la propuesta legislativa se envió al Senado para su debate.

"La financiación de estas mejoras de la infraestructura es necesaria," dijo el Representante Estatal Barry Finegold. "Que fuimos capaces de trabajar juntos para garantizar un lugar para estos proyectos en la legislación de bonos es una gran noticia para todos en Lawrence."

"Esta inversión en la infraestructura de la ciudad avanzará mejoras de transporte en beneficio de todos los residentes y negocios de Lawrence," opinó el Representante David Torrisi. "Como de costumbre, es el resultado de la persistencia y la colaboración," siguió diciendo Torrisi.

Lantigua reconoció que fondos adicionales podrían ser necesarios para los proyectos en el futuro, y dijo que estaba dispuesto a buscar los recursos disponibles.

"Esto es un proceso que sigue," dijo Lantigua. "Vamos a hacer todo lo que tengamos que hacer para ver estos proyectos hasta el final."

Bellesini Academy celebró Seis años de educar a los jóvenes de Lawrence



El viernes, 13 de junio, 2008, Bellesini Academy celebró la graduación de su clase de octavo grado en el Cascia Hall, en el campus de Merrimack College de North Andover.

Todos los graduados recibieron becas y fueron aceptados por lo menos, en una escuela secundaria privada, entre las cuales se encuentran Phillips Academy Andover, Phillips Exeter Academy, Groton School, Governors, Pingree School, St. Paul's,

Brooks School, St John's Prep, Central Catholic High School, Austin Prep y Notre Dame High School. Y lo que es aún más notable, este año a la clase de 8vo grado se le ha ofrecido un total combinado de más de \$ 2.2 millones en becas para sus estudios de secundaria en los próximos cuatro años.

Este año la graduación de la Academia Bellesini marca el sexto año de enseñanza preparatoria para los niños en los grados 5 al 8 de familias de bajos ingresos en la Ciudad

de Lawrence. Bellesini cree firmemente que la educación es la clave para romper el ciclo de la pobreza. El objetivo principal de la Academia es preparar a todos sus estudiantes a que puedan cursar estudios superiores.

Bellesini brinda a sus estudiantes que corren el riesgo de fracasar en Lawrence las ventajas que gozan los estudiantes en los barrios suburbanos: pequeño número de alumnos por clase, riguroso plan de estudios, profesores altamente calificados, y una gran cantidad de actividades extracurriculares. La Academia exige a todos sus estudiantes a participar en un día de doce horas de actividades escolares que incluye un plan académico riguroso de estudios que se enseñan en clases pequeñas, un programa después de la escuela que se ejecuta entre las 3 y 5 pm, más un programa de estudios de 7 a 9 de la noche. Además, todos los estudiantes deben asistir a un programa de verano de cuatro semanas de duración para continuar su instrucción académica en un escenario al estilo de un campo de St John's Prep en Danvers.

Como resultado del detallado y ampliado año escolar, los estudiantes de Bellesini obtienen un promedio de casi dos grados cada año en matemáticas y artes del lenguaje, poniéndolos al mismo o por encima del nivel de grado para cuando se gradúen en el 8vo grado. Todos los miembros de las clases de 2006, 2007 y 2008 fueron aceptados a una escuela preparatoria privada de high school del área.

Hasta la fecha, a los graduados de Bellesini (con la primera clase que se graduó en 2005) se les han ofrecido un total de más de 5 millones de dólares en becas de secundaria. 100% de sus graduados permanecen matriculados en la escuela secundaria. La primera clase de estudiantes de Bellesini entrará en su último año de escuela secundaria este otoño.

Bellesini Academy Celebrates Six Years of Educating Youth in Lawrence

Bellesini Academy celebrated the graduation of their current eighth grade class on Friday, June 13th at Cascia Hall on the Merrimack College campus in North Andover.

Every member of the class of 2008 gained acceptance to at least one private high school on scholarship including Phillips Andover, Phillips Exeter, Groton School, Governors, Pingree School, St. Paul's, Brooks School, St. John's Prep, Central Catholic High School, Austin Prep and Notre Dame High School. Even more remarkable, this year's 8th grade class has been offered a combined total of over \$2.2 million in four year high school scholarships.

This year's graduation marks Bellesini Academy's sixth year of providing tuition-free preparatory education to boys in grades 5-8 from low-income families in the city of Lawrence. Bellesini believes that education is the key to breaking the cycle of poverty. The primary goal of the Academy is to prepare all students to attend a private preparatory high school.

Bellesini brings the advantages enjoyed by students in suburban neighborhoods to at-risk students in Lawrence: small class size, rigorous curriculum, highly qualified teachers, and a wealth of extracurricular activities. The Academy requires all students to participate in a twelve hour school day that includes rigorous academic curriculum taught in small classes, an after-school program that runs from 3-5pm, and an evening study program from 7-9pm. In addition, all students attend a four week summer program that continues academic instruction in a camp like setting at St. John's Prep in Danvers.

As a result of the comprehensive, extended school year, Bellesini students gain an average of nearly two grade levels each year in math and language arts, putting them at or above grade level by the time they graduate in 8th grade. Every member of the classes of 2006, 2007, and 2008 was accepted to one of the area's private college preparatory high schools. To date, Bellesini graduates (with the first class graduating in 2005) have been offered a total of more than \$5 million in high school scholarships. 100% of its graduates remain enrolled in high school. The first class of Bellesini students will be entering their senior year of high school this fall.





Lantigua Files Bills to Toughen Gun Laws

State Representative William Lantigua (D-Lawrence) has filed two separate pieces of legislation to strengthen laws regarding gun possession in the Commonwealth. The first would increase penalties for failure to report the loss, theft, or recovery of a firearm, and for unlawful possession of a firearm. Another would impose mandatory jail time for failure to turn in weapons after expiration of a firearm identification card or license, and would require photographic proof of a weapon's serial number for renewal of any gun license.

Lantigua said he believes that the harsher penalties will serve as a deterrent and help make communities safer.

"We need to send the message that keeping track of a firearm is the owner's primary responsibility," Lantigua said. "When deadly weapons are unaccounted for, tragedies happen."

For failure to report the loss, theft, or recovery of a firearm, Massachusetts law currently provides for a fine of not less than \$200 nor more than \$1,000 for a first offense, and not less than \$1,000 or more than \$5,000 for a second offense. Lantigua's legislation would establish a fine of \$1,000 and one year's probation for a first offense, and a fine of \$5,000 and two years' probation for a second offense. Failure to report the loss, theft, or recovery of a firearm to the state's criminal history systems board and the local licensing authority also is punishable by suspension or revocation of a person's firearms identification card, his license to carry firearms, or both. (A firearm ID card, issued by the criminal history systems board, is required for possession of a shotgun, rifle, or large-capacity firearm, while a firearms license, issued by a local police department, is required for handgun ownership.)

The bill also increases jail terms for unlawful possession of firearms. For unlawful possession of a loaded or unloaded shotgun, rifle, or large-capacity firearm, the bill would impose a minimum mandatory sentence of two years, an increase from the current eighteen months to two-and-a-half years. For unlawful possession of a handgun, the minimum sentence would be five years, up from two-and-a-half to five years.

Similarly, a second bill would increase fines and introduce mandatory jail sentences for possession of firearms after the expiration of a firearm ID card or license. Currently, failure to turn in a shotgun, rifle, or large-capacity firearm after expiration of a firearm ID card, or failure to turn in a handgun after expiration of a firearms license, are punishable by a civil fine of \$500 to \$5,000.

Lantigua's bill would make these criminal offenses, punishable by fines of not less than \$5,000 or more than \$10,000 and imprisonment for six months to one year. It also would require individuals seeking renewal of firearms ID cards or licenses to show photographic evidence of the serial numbers of the weapons they own.



Recognizes its Integrative Medicine Program in fight against childhood obesity

On June 30, 2008, Acting Surgeon General Rear Admiral Steven K. Galson, M.D., M.P.H., visited Greater Lawrence Family Health Center in Lawrence, MA, as part of his nationwide tour to promote the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Childhood Overweight and Obesity Prevention Initiative.

DPH Reminds Parents About New Booster Seat Law

The Department of Public Health (DPH) is urging parents to make sure children under eight years old are riding in a booster seat while passengers in an automobile. The new law, signed by Governor Deval Patrick, goes into effect on July 10, 2008. It requires children to ride in booster seats until they are eight years old or reach 4 feet 9 inches in height.

The previous law only required children younger than five years old and weighing less than 40 pounds to ride in a child safety seat. Both laws require children ages eight to 12 years old to wear a seat belt when traveling in an automobile.

"This new law sends parents and caregivers an important message that seat belts are not designed for children, but booster seats are," said DPH Commissioner John Auerbach. "Most injuries can be prevented by using booster seats properly."

Motor vehicle crashes are the number one killer of children between the ages of four and eight. Booster seats can reduce those injury rates by 58 percent compared to seat belt use for the same age group. The booster seat positions the seat belt across the stronger parts of a child's body – the hip and shoulder – rather than the stomach and neck. The safest place for children to ride is in the back seat.

Booster seats can be purchased for between \$15 to \$150 and must be used with a vehicle lap/shoulder belt. The two most widely used types of booster seats are the "high back" or a "backless" booster seat. Both must be used with a vehicle's lap/shoulder belt for proper positioning.

Who is Really Working 'for the Children'

During a City Council meeting people such as the Superintendent of Schools Wilfredo T. Laboy impressed upon the council that 19% of the children were special education and that it cost about 5.7 MILLION dollars to transport these children to places as far away as Cape Cod. The council, especially those that were voted out, didn't seem to hear me when I talked about ideas such as converting a part of the old high school into a special education facility, except for one of them, Marie Gosselin, to give her full credit for listening. Had the council listened to the foresight of its citizens, this council wouldn't have to be deliberating the matter in hindsight. The council, I believe, was being asked to give up \$935,000 for general transportation of the students. I believe that as a citizen of the community that had I heard that nearly 20% of the children in Lawrence have been labeled "special education" would raise an eyebrow. But it didn't.

Let me explain how it's even more troubling than a label of 20% Special Education. According to 2006-2007 numbers 17.8 % of the children were classified as SpEd, less than now at 19%. So 2,175 children were classified as SpEd, in 14 grade levels. In the 7th grade levels that are tested for MCAS (Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System) 1,439 students were considered SpEd. 66% of all SpEd students fell into grade levels being tested by MCAS. Now, as a matter of knowledge let's talk about these SpEd labels. My son in 2004 was labeled as SpEd, he needed no transportation. His only learning problem was that the school system used substandard teaching material; the ELA (English Language Arts) was missing key components to the whole

program. The schools were not teaching subjects known as CORE subjects required by law, so they could focus on the CORE subjects being tested in MCAS, that year. At home, the student was able to learn 8th grade math with minimum teaching, but at school was failing 4th grade math. In addition, the ELA program the school put him in (without parental consent) to speed him up to the level of the other students, actually kept him back, and it was me, the parent, that discovered it not the school and asserted my parental right to put him back in grade level classes.

This move significantly increased his ELA test scores. Based on this knowledge and talking to other parents who received the IEP letter (Individual Education Program) it would seem that the school is labeling children for two purposes it shouldn't be: 1. It provides a category to subdivide the students. 2. It matches the amount of money that the state and federal government are allowing for SpEd students.

As the only parent not employed by the state attending the Title One Practitioners Meeting, I found this information out first hand. I thought it disturbing that districts were being encouraged to label more children to match the money they would receive for doing so.

Now as for subdividing and new categories, the school can manipulate the

MCAS percentages by creating a new category. The only catch is that after two years they are accountable for keeping track of that new category. Bet a lot of people out there don't know that. I bet that if you look over the last 10 years you would find a lot of new categories that were created. For instance, if I were to classify a number of children that were born under a blue moon, with a father born in September or mother born in July, I could do so, and in doing so, remove them from the main group of students reporting MCAS numbers. In other words, manipulating the numbers. Just like 19% of all SpEd students do not take transportation, but the amount for them is 5.7 MILLION. So to the city council, doesn't it disgust you that 19% of all students are labeled Special Education? Isn't that a number that is extremely high? How many city council members claim to think so highly of the children, that this didn't even raise an eyebrow?

I hope the voters of Lawrence consider information like this, and ponder why they voted in elected officials that don't think this is something disturbing. If the person you elected is blowing sunshine your way, it could be because they represent the interests of the school system, the city, and the favors they get in return for not seeing or hearing these in-your-face issues. Next year is a voting year, don't forget, register.

Mayors' Summer Jobs for Youth Initiative

Now in its 7th year, the Mayors' Summer Jobs for Youth Initiative offers a young person a wage and a valuable learning experience that can last a lifetime, while employers gain easy access to Work-Ready Youth who are prepared for the workplace and eager to succeed in a job.

On June 20th, 2008 the Mayors of Lawrence, Haverhill and Methuen announced the 2008 Mayors' Summer Jobs for Youth Initiative at a press conference that took place at ValleyWorks Career Center in Lawrence. The effort organized by the Merrimack Valley Workforce Investment Board (MVWIB) was directed to businesses in the region and their contribution to the development of the youth.

Based on available statistics, Fred Carberry, Executive Director of the MVWIB, said that "youth who work in summer jobs do better in school, are more likely to graduate and go on to college, are less likely to get involved in negative

behavior, such as gangs, substance abuse, and teen pregnancy, and are better equipped with the skills needed to find a job when they're ready to enter the workforce."

Carberry describes the program as simple for local businesses. "The ValleyWorks Career Center staff prepares participating youth for work and facilitates the matching of appropriate applicants with job requirements. The MVWIB promotes available job opportunities from employers. Employers decide which Work Ready Youth best meets their needs and have the final say on all hiring selections." In addition, ValleyWorks Career Center maintains a Work Ready Youth Talent Bank from which employers can draw to fill any youth-appropriate jobs throughout the year. As a result, this Summer Jobs Program will offer employers benefits even after the school year begins.

Chris Shannon also from the MVWIB said that by "employing youth this summer businesses can also have a positive impact on their bottom line," concluding that their cost would be of approximately \$1,300 for a six week period while among other benefits receiving free recruitment and outreach, free job posting advertising, pre-screened youth who come to you for final

selection. "The potential combined value of these services alone could completely pay for FOUR part-time youth salaries this summer," said Shannon.

Michael J. Sullivan of Lawrence, urged the business community to take action as right now the level of national joblessness for teens is greater than at any time over the past 60 years. To boost teen employment opportunities this year, Mayor Sullivan described private industry as one of many strategies that can be pursued. "Although we've been able to increase the number of summer jobs through grant funding, the number of summer jobs available to our youth through private industry has decreased. This summer, please help me in getting our young people off the streets and into quality jobs. The cost is minimal but the benefits are priceless!" he concluded.

Mayor James J. Fiorentini of Haverhill, said that by providing the youth with work this summer, the region will create a more viable workforce by providing the youth with an income, educating them with employment opportunities available in the region, and by training them on "soft skills" they will need for future workplace success. This last one was cited by Mayor Fiorentini as a contributor to our current workforce crisis. He described these skills – such as teamwork, communication, workplace ethics, and decision-making – as "essential to successful entrance into the workforce."

Although funds for this initiative have been increased, only 175 low-income youth will receive subsidized employment. Estimated Low-Income youth in Haverhill, Lawrence and Methuen surpass the 7,000 according to the Massachusetts Department of Education which defines low-income as eligible for free or reduced lunch.

Mayor William M. Manzi, III of Methuen, said that a summer job is not just a matter of job readiness or a means to prevent youth violence during summer months. "According to research published by Project Bread in 2006, the prevalence of hunger is 6 times greater than the state average in Lawrence, Haverhill and Methuen," said Manzi. "One of every three children lives in a family that struggles to put food on the table." Requesting the business community to ask him how to hire a youth this summer, Mayor Manzi concluded by saying that "a summer job for many can mean survival."

The Mayors' Summer Jobs for Youth Initiative is funded in part by the 2008 Youth Works Summer Jobs for At-Risk Youth Grant, administered by the Commonwealth Corporation on behalf of Governor Deval Patrick and Labor & Workforce Development Secretary Suzanne Bump.

Lawrence Wins Funding in Transportation Bond

State Representative William Lantigua (D-Lawrence) announced that the transportation bond bill passed recently by the House of Representatives features four of his key earmarks for projects in Lawrence.

The earmarks, totaling nearly \$3.5 million, include:

- \$1.5 million for a pedestrian footbridge over Route 114 near the new Lawrence High School, where a student was struck and killed by a car last year;
- \$1 million for the Union Crossing project, a Lawrence CommunityWorks initiative which will transform a network of textile mills into a new residential and commercial center;
- \$750,000 for repair and refurbishment of the South Canal Bridge; and
- \$225,000 for repairs to Hampshire Street.

Lantigua said he believes that a new footbridge will enhance public safety on Winthrop Street near Lawrence High School. Last October, 11-year-old Dario Rodriguez was struck by a car as he attempted to cross the busy stretch of road, which separates the school and Sullivan Park on the north side from shops and fast-food restaurants on the south. He suffered massive head injuries and died the next morning.

"This footbridge won't just protect students, but all pedestrians and drivers," Lantigua said. "My only regret is that we weren't able to get it built before a young boy lost his life."

Lantigua said he was encouraged by the inclusion of funding for repairs to the South Canal Bridge and Hampshire Street, and for the Union Crossing economic redevelopment project.

"Infrastructure maintenance is the key to the continued economic health of any community," Lantigua said. "This is especially true in a historic city like Lawrence, with its system of canals and bridges. These upgrades will greatly improve the chances for success of Union Crossing and other redevelopment projects."

Other members of the Lawrence delegation expressed their satisfaction at the amount of funding allocated to the city in the bond bill, which now moves on to the Senate for debate.

"Funding for these infrastructure improvements is necessary," said Rep. Barry Finegold. "That we were able to work together to secure a spot for these projects in the bond bill is great news for all of Lawrence."

"This investment into the City's infrastructure will advance local priority transportation improvements to the benefit of the residents and businesses of Lawrence," added Rep. David Torrisi. "As usual, it's the result of persistence and collaboration."

Lantigua acknowledged that additional funding might be needed for the projects, and said he was prepared to pursue any available resources.

"This is an ongoing process," Lantigua said. "We'll do whatever we have to do to see these projects to completion."


An AED is a device about the size of a laptop computer that analyzes the heart's rhythm for any abnormalities and, if necessary, directs the rescuer to deliver an electrical shock to the victim. This shock, called defibrillation, may help the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm of its own.

"This is a critical piece of equipment and one that the Club needed to have on its premises. We are very grateful for this generous gift by Patriot Ambulance. It could save a life here at the Club," commented Markus Fischer, Executive Director.

Training is necessary in order to understand the role of defibrillation. Training in CPR is performed for all Program Staff at the Club on an annual basis and now the Club will include training in AED skills.

According to the American Red Cross, statistics show that more than 200,000 Americans die of sudden cardiac arrest every year. Up to 50,000 of these deaths could have been prevented if someone had initiated the Cardiac Chain of Survival, and an automated external defibrillator (AED) had been available for immediate use at the time of the emergency.

The Boys & Girls Club of Lawrence opened its brand new facility on 136 Water Street in November, 2006. The programs at the Club are divided into 6 core program areas; Character & Leadership, Education & Career Development, The Arts, Sports & Fitness, Health & Life Skills and Special Programs. Although they had their differences on this budget vote, they participated in this process in a way I have not seen since Julia Silverio ran the Budget and Finance Committee with Gil Frechette. They have truly changed the tone and professionalism of the City Council for the better. It just goes to show you that government can work when we elect experienced, educated and committed individuals. Finally a summer free of worrying if a budget would be passed at all and if Lawrence would spend most of the early fall in gridlock. It is appreciated.

Hello Rumbo readers. I am sure by now everyone has heard the good news that the city budget passed the first time around. This is great for the city because it gives us time to work out whatever issues need to be worked out without the state losing patience and without people involved in the process losing patience with one another. Credit goes to the mayor, Budget and Finance Director Mark Andrews and to the members of the City Council, particularly to the Budget and Finance subcommittee. As I indicated in my last article, we are considerably beneath the funding level mandated by the state Board of Library Commissioners. They have indicated, however, a willingness to work with us and I am very optimistic about getting through this with no break in services and no inconvenience to our patrons.

The other great thing about having a budget in place so early is that I hope to be able to fill some positions here that are included in our budget but remain unfilled. We did lose some positions in the December layoffs and in the cut we took in this budget. Still, I do have room to increase staff somewhat and hope to do so as soon as possible. We are stretched to the maximum right now. With vacations coming up in the summer my staff are working in overdrive all of the time. I appreciate what they do but they need some relief.

Former Children's Room outreach coordinator, Terry Farish, will be working with us on a project and I am delighted to have her back. She received a grant from the Massachusetts Foundation for the Humanities for her Tell Me a Cuento project and the library is acting as partner. Tell me a Cuento is a project designed to enhance family literacy. We will be running

programs here at the library as well as at other locations where groups want to get involved. The project involves reading and discussing children's literature with the aim of teaching parents and caregivers how to read to their children effectively and make reading a family habit. The earlier children start to read the more likely that they will make reading an important part of their lives.

Because I am the Library Director a lot of people assume that I was a "bookworm" as a child. I actually was not. I did enjoy reading sometimes but usually I wanted to be outside on my bike and playing with my friends. It is only as I grew up that I came to really enjoy reading. However, both of my parents were big readers and a trip to the library to restock was pretty much a weekly event. So, while I didn't read as much as perhaps I should have as a child, I was in an atmosphere where reading was modeled and I eventually followed that model. Tell Me a Cuento is a program designed to promote this atmosphere in peoples own homes. If you have a group that meets regularly and would like to incorporate this training in your agenda please contact us for further information. The program is designed for group work but if individuals are interested we can set up more groups so let us know.

Hope everyone has had a chance to check out Essex Street's new look Assistant Director Ana Santos and I attended the ceremony last week and we were both impressed, as we were walking back, how many new businesses there are on Essex Street. I think this could be a real important thing for business in the city. See you at the library.


